

press upon the peo-ple of the United States, the vital part that nut trees of all kinds must have in any sound national or state tree-planting program in this country. Back of it are men who have schieved remarkable results through scientific experimental work in nut culture and are farmers in particular, to opportunity. Nuts, which are exceedingly rich in protein and fat, have too long been disregarded as an item of the staple diet. Nut trees in great quantities along the national and state highways, but trees on the barren billsides and nut orchards f varieties especially adapted to climate, such a program selentifically handled will one day, according to the belief of authorities on the subject, help in

a large measure to solve the problem of the tion's food supply. Such figures as these are cited: "Twenty-five million acres of nut trees would more than supply the people of the United ucts, protein and fat."

During the last few years much scientific experimental work in nut growing has been carried on by members of the Northern Nut Growers' as anciation, which includes representatives of some twenty-three states, but is in no sense a commer-cial organization. By cross pollenization and by hybridizing, the association members are getting extraordinary results in the way of big, lucious nuts of lusty growth. Almonds, English walnuts, succulent pine nuts not indigenous in the latitude of New York, for example, are now growing in various parts of the state. By hybridizing, old bickery nut trees that formerly produced nuts of an inferior quality are now producing nuts of the best

With the government and states working to gether in the establishment of market highways and the building of permanent roads, now is the time to urge the planting of trees. Community effort is needed for such work. If such action as this had been taken in this country in forme years our roadsides would be more beautiful, the former more independent.

Unfortunately the tree has not been used yet for crops yielding stuple food in places where men till the soil. They begin with crops which return annual results in exchange for labor. Now that the crops from annual plants are becoming smalle every year in proportion to the increased number of inhabitants, men will set great trees at work upon millions of half-barren acres. These trees will return a larger profit for tenn labor than

would be required for annual plant crops. In many parts of the world where august crop plants are raised with difficulty, tree crops fur nish a staple starch food. There are regions in which chestnuts and pines practically take the place of wheat and corn, and these trees may be rabed profitably where wheat and corn will not

At present a hybrid tree is a great curtosity; men often travel far to see it. They do not stop o realize that a thousand hybrid trees can be produced with very little trouble, and among these would be some of enormous value to the
