An Uncalled-for Attack

It has been the policy of the Republican for the past forty-two years (that is as far as we can remember), not to "butt into" family or church squabbles, believing that such things should die as quickly and quietly as possible. But we have something before us that cannot die until the transgressor either makes a public apology, or in one way or another saves the organization the trouble of expelling him from the community.

As all know, we are referring to the uncalled-for, un-Christian, ungentlemanly, untrue, and, yes, damnable slurs cast at one who is entirely above reproach, one, if not the, brightest young man in town, Lino Rubba. Born of Italian parents, he is intensely American, fought on the other side of the water with our boys, for those principles which every American holds so dear. He has secured an excellent education, and he uses it. All like him, for he is a perfect gentleman; and why an attack should be made against him, the court of justice only can decide.

The signature affixed to the mimeograph letter circulated last Sunday, at St. Joseph's Church, is stamped at the bottom, "R. Sorgi," and we take for granted that the writer is responsible for the desecration of words and constipation of truth and brains therein exhibited. A most gentlemanly reply has been circulated by Rubba; and we will leave it to the intelligent people to judge which should remain in Hammoncton.

We have had words with Rev. Sorgi. He understands perfectly well that we are of the opinion that he is an American, that his former attacks against the Red Cross were base untruths, his slurs against one of our highly esteemed ladies the act of a gentleman, and those against a fellow parson without a particle of excuse.

This last hemorrhage of words was occasioned, probably, by the appearance of a petition, with it, it is said, several hundred signatures, asking Sorgi's removal. Some definite action will be taken next week. Let us say right here that Lino Rubba did not start said petition, although he signed it.

The Hammoncton Church needs a priest whom all will love and respect, one who is a red-blooded American in principle, one who will build up, not tear down. We have had that stamp of men, and we shall be glad to greet another when he takes over the local parish.

The reduction in the number of Freeholders is being discussed, pro and con. It is claimed that the present number is unwieldy. The dog question is again agitating our townspolice. There are several hundred useless curs feeding out of other people's garbage cans; and when warm weather comes on, they will be a greater menace.

Thursday night was somewhat chilly. Some people even dared to imagine that there was a skiff of ice Friday morning. As yet we have heard of no damage being done, though early strawberry blossoms may show the effect yet. Peach and other blossoms are out in full, and we hope, indeed, that they have not, and will not suffer.

The old subject of removal of the County Seat from May's Landing to Pleasantville or Atlantic City is occupying people's minds, throughout the county. We believe Egg Harbor would be the most central location, although we have not heard that they want it. May's Landing is certainly hard to get at, from this end of the county.

About ten years ago, each of the suburban schools was furnished with bulbs for a tulip bed. These have long since disappeared except one at Magnolia School. This one is a beautiful sight and, set as it is in an otherwise bare school yard, is brilliant with color. Great credit belongs to Miss Brownlee, the teacher, who has cared for this bed, and also to the scholars who have assisted her, and not one of whom will pluck one of the blossoms.






