### OLDEST GHOST **ABOUT TO STIR**

Every Twelve Years Since Spanish Invasion Body of Murdered Priest Appears.

### WON'T STAY INTERRED

Spanlard Killed by Indians in New Mexico Who Feared He Would Betray Them to Spanish Invadere

Isleta, N. M.-Here reposes at present the oldest and most persistent ghost in America. This might be inscribed in the little adobe church

Long ago, at the time of the first Spanish invasions of southwestern America, a Spanish friar was captured by the Indians. Although kept as a prisoner for a time, he later won their confidence and as years went by was admitted to their peculiar religious and political circles.

At last the rumor reached the tribe of the advance of Coronado in search of treasure. The Indians feared trenchery on the part of their Spanatabbed to death by one of the more skentical members of the tribe.

The medicine men were berrified at the crime, for not only had they come to respect the Spaniard's Christian teachings, but had made him a participator in their own religion. And above all, they knew what might be expected of enraged Spaniards if they should discover the crime.

Burled Near Altar. The priest's body was hastily wrapped in a sheet and without any prayer or ceremony buried deep in front of the altar in the little Christian church in Isleta.

Coronado's men never learned of the crime, but a few years later a pecultar mound appeared in front of altar in the little church. The horrifled natives observed the mound was exactly the length and width of a man's body. Soon the bard earth floor cracked and one morning, just 12 years after the burial of the priest, his body was discovered lying face upward above the spot where he had been buried.

priest had been dead but a few days, and the wound in his back was clotted with fresh blood. There seemed to be nothing to do but to bury him again. This they did and were care ful to press the earth down very

#### Obest Appeared.

This went on every 12 years until 1912. Then when, according to habit, the ghost appeared, the old men catted a council. The governor was sent for, as well as the priest of the parish and the archbishop of Santa Fe and a visiting cardinal from Itome. They dil came and a paper was signed to the offect that they had seen the body. Again it was burfed, but this time in a heavy oak carbet, and over the grave, and even over the whole floor of the church, was laid and palled a henvy plank floor,

Plank floors are not common in fittte adobe churches in this region, and this in the explanation of the most truthful man in Isloin, Hut now, plataly stable, there is a hulge in the planking the size of a man's body and the natis in the floor protrude!

Apparently the ghost is trying to come again to Islein, and the townspeople are tooking forward apprehenplyely to 1924.
