By 1886 the operations of the partners had reached their peak. They owned about 800,000 acres in California and had large boldings in Oregon and Nevada.

"I once thought that I should own the whole state of California," said Miller, about 1905. "I would have owned half of it, had I not made the mistake of buying in Oregon and Nevada, and my son, if he had lived, could have bought the other half."

It was in 1886 that Miller and Lux had 80,000 cattle and 100,000 sheep. For years their annual sale of meat had averaged \$1,500,000. They had organized water companies, had laid out town sites and had built towns. They had constructed
