With this issue our connection with the Atlantic Democrat will cease. While we have many friends in the county and elsewhere whom we have labor and toiled with since the establishment of the Democrat to give the Democracy of the country an organ which was always of their service, and particularly for their benefit, circumstances which we cannot control render it necessary for us to sever our connection with it.
