Plant food may be present in abundance, yet the condition of the soil will not allow it to be properly assimilated by the plant. Hence, the plant is poorly nourished in the midst of

Acid or sour conditions can be overcome by the use of lime. Humus may be replenished as stable manure, leaf mould, cover crops or such. In sweet soil filled with humus, the fertilizer of plant food is most efficient because soil bacteria are most active under such conditions. Too much fertilizer is unnecessary and perhaps harmful. The condition of the soil is the important consideration. When the Ingram, J. D.; Charles Woolbert, S. M. C. soil is in the proper condition a moderate apdication of fertilizer will produce more than a heavier application on a soil unfriendly to plant development.

The importance of bacteria in relation to agriculture is now commonly recognized. However, all the factors affecting soil fartility are not fully understood. It is known that rotozoa, the smallest group of animals, exist in the soil in large numbers. They are believed by some scientists to have some influence upon the fertility of the soil, but their exact effect is not known. Studies of this group of organisms are being conducted in the laboratorie of the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station. Results of considerable scientific interest are being obtained.

Among the several projects in corn improve ment work, which were carried on by the extension division of the New Jersey State Poultrymen of New Jersey Find Greater Agricultural College during the past season was a seed-growing project.
