FARMERS' NEEDS

More Profitable Agriculture.

UPHOLDS

State School Board, of Which He Is Vice President, Thoroughly In Accord With Anything That Produces Better Results For Children of Agriculturists and of Other Residents of

New Brunswick, N. J., Dec. 29.-Farmers from every county in the itate were in attendance at the "Soils and Crops day," the second in the annual conference which was planned by the late E. B. Voorhees, the former director of the state experimental station here, and Franklin Dye, secretary of the state board of agriculture. The session today was replete with interest, and there was a larger attendance than yesterday. Men versed in the practical and experimental tilling of the soil gave the visiting delegates the benefit of their knowledge.

The Hon. Joseph S. Frelinghuysen, president of the state board of agri culture and vice president of the state board of education, was the chairman of today's session. The topic of his address was "A More Profitable Agriculture In New Jersey," and, while he told the farmers much about the trend of the times being "back to the soil, he gave a comprehensive and interesting review of the public school system.

What State Does For Farm Boys. The senator spoke of what was being accomplished in the state in agricultural and vocational training and said that a better education for the boys brought up on the Yarm would fit them for a life of independence and comfort and make them proud of their calling. He brought out the fact that the sustenance of the people was of far greater importance than any other line of endeavor.

Throughout his address it was apparent that Senator Frelinghuysen, as a farmer himself, had a clear idea of the farmer's viewpoint, particularly with reference to the cost of the maintenance of the school system in the shape of taxes. In a comprehensive review of the school situation for ten years Senator Frelinghuysen described many of the weak points of the sys tem before its reorganization. He said it was a known fact that many schools were unfit for the school children, that financial matters were handled with gross carelessness, there was little cooveration from the school department, the sale of bonds was controlled by a few brokers, the railroads were allowed a year to pay taxes in brief, he reviewed thoroughly the conditions that brought about the investigation and reorganization of the system.

High Tribute to Associates.

Some of the things that had already heen accomplished by way of contrast were described. The senator paid a high tribute to Calvin N. Kendall, the state commissioner; and his assistants. J. Brognard Betts, Albert B. Meredith, J. J. Savitz, Lewis N. Carris, Thomas D. Sensor and Herbert N. Morse.

That a better relationship between the state body and the many local boards of education exists was shown by the senator, and the spirit of cooperation that is thus tostered is helpful. He mentioned the higher stand- afternoon. A cordial invitation extended to all ard of teaching as having a good effect to attend the services. throughout the state and spoke of the fact that practically all of the county superintendents indorsed the state board and its excellent work.

He said the state board advocated an additional normal school for south Jersey, which he hoped might be realized the near future. He spoke of the

excellent work done by the summer schools. The raising of the qualifica tions of the tenchers had succeed Senator Frelingbuysen impressed

upon his hearers the fact that the present state board of education was strong in its advocacy for better training in the "three R's."
