AT THE COUNTY CAPITAL ITEMS OF INTEREST TO COUNTY FARMERS

AGRICULTURE SUGGESTIONS AND RECENT RURAL HAPPENINGS

During the late Winter and early Spring, reeders of fowls that have good-sized combs uner considerable losses from frosted combs. Freezing usually take place on nights when the temperature is low and there is considerable humidity in the atmosphere. If birds are subjected to direct drafts of cold air there is also danger of frosting. Poultrymen should try to cut down the number of frozen combs in their flocks to a minimum during the next few weeks. This can be done by keeping the scratch and work continually during the day, protecting them from cold drafts while on the erobes at night, and closing the muslin curin open front bouses on severely cold lights. If, however, frozen combs do occur he birds should be treated immediately on the following morning. The frozen combe should be thawed out with snow or cold. water and an olntment rubbed in gently with the fingers. A very good ointment for this purpose can be made of 5 parts of vaseline, 2 sarts of glycerine and I part of turpenting. This relieves pain and reduces inflammatic rozen combs mean lowered vitality in the

bird's body and seriously decrease fersility in ntobing eggs. Sweet potato growers have always believed that potasti is an essential part of sweet potato fertilizer. For two years they have had to get along with very little, yet fairly good crops were produced. How long can this be kept up? The shortage of potash will have a serious effect upon the sweet potato production in another season. Of course, if the crop is generally short the prices will be higher, but that is just when the grower wants to have a good-

sized crop. Years ago excellent "sweets" were grown with manure exclusively. Have our growers forgotten their old methods? Manure contains considerable potash, especially if it has not leached out. A light application of this material may be plowed under, or well-rotted manure may be spread along in the row. In any event, if the rows are made up well shead of time, the soil will settle enough to firm the soil somewhat and help produce chunky

The specialist particularly recommends the use of unleached wood sahes, as this material delially carries 5 or 6 per cent. of potash and considerable lime. One ton of ground limestone per acre will help to liberate potash in the soil and increase the yield.

As these residents are ch less soluble they have only about half the fertilizing value of what has been leached out, and their value is estimated at \$5.65, or a trifle less than one-fourth the value of what is wasted. There is also a loss of about one-third of the total dry, or organic matter when manure is exposed to the weather for several




