## MUD WORK AHEAD FOR JANUARY COURT TERM

COURT JURY WILL ASSEMBLE NEXT TUESDAY.

Forty-Eight Civil Issues Listed for Trial Before Judge Endicott—Two Homicide Cases On Criminal Calendar.

Considerable work is ahead for the Atlantic County Courts, which will open Tuesday next for the January Term. Justice Thomas W. Trenchard will be present to open the Court, assisted by Law Judge E. A. Higbee and Circuit Court Judge A. B. Endicott. In the presence of the County Clerk Samuel Kirby will call the Grand Jury, drawn by Sheriff E. J. Johnson, and administer the oath, after which Justice Trenchard will deliver his charge.

## SUGGEST GAME LAW CHANGES.

Commission Would Repeal Act Prohibiting Hunting Deer With Dogs.

Many changes in the game laws are urged by the Board of Fish and Game Commissioners in its annual report to Governor Fort. Among the most important of these recommendations is that a big limit be fixed for game birds to be taken in one day, as follows: Quail, not to exceed 10; English pheasant, 3; Hungarian partridge, 8; woodcock, 10; ruffed grouse, 3; red birds, 10; rail birds, 25; ducks, 20; geese, 10; brant, 10; shore birds, 25.
