An outbreak of hog cholera at the Agriculural Experiment Station presented an opporfunity for the animal husbandman to test the efficiency of hog cholera serum. The disease was stamped out in October, and the results have been reported by the animal husband

in all, 201 pigs, varying in age from a few years, were treated with scrum. The outbreak occurred in a lot of 32 Spring gilts, averaging in weight from 80 to 100 pounds. All were inthe time of the first injection. A second injection three days later was applied to some of animals, and a third injection later to some of these. However, 27 of the total died, and those which survived were so hadly stunted that they were practically worthless. In the case of the survivors, the disease had not reached an advanced stage at the time of injection. Most of the other animals were well at the exposed to the disease. In every case where serum was injected into pigs whose temperature was normal, the serum prevented the disease. Twelve pigs, constituting a check herd, were not treated with serum. These were well at the time the others were treated, and were turned in with the sick pigs. All but

These results demonstrate clearly, first, that hog cholera serum prevents the disease if applied before symptoms appear; second, that it seldom cures if applied after symptoms have appeared; and third, when cures occur, they are of little economic value.

On most farms there may be found accumin tions of muck, peat, leaf mold or ditch deposits. These materials are frequently hauled to the cultivated fields and spread. EXTENSION OF GOOD ROADS OUTSTANDING POLICY OF THE YEAR

ORGANIZATION WAS HARMONIOUS

Mosquito Extermination Work To Continue, But Members Decry Misuse of Funds—Standing Committees Appointed-Banquet At Egg Harbor City Followed Meeting At Court House.

At one of the most barmonious, meetings it has ever held, the Board of Chosen Freeholders Saturday last effected its re-organization at the Court House, electing Freeholder Samuel Winterbottom, of Egg Harbor City, its Director for 1916, and fixing the budget for the year. Freeholder Winterbottom was nominated by Freeholder Kay Johnson, of Port Republic, who had been mentioned as a candidate but withdrew, his name before the meeting opened, making Winterbottom's election unanimone Further levelopment of Atlantic County's good rouds system will be the keynote of th new Director's administration, as outlined in his brief speech of acceptance. "Good roads," said Mr. Winterisittom, "are Atlantic County's factories. We manufacture farm produce and recreation, and for the success of both it is necessary that we have the best kinds of good roads and plenty of them." It is estimated that upwards of half-a-million dollars will be expended by the county for the development f its roads during the year.

Auditor Absalom Highee was re-elected for three years, at an annual salary of \$1,500 and \$100 for travelling expenses, and Franklin Smith, assistant to the County Collector, was granted an increase of salary of: \$300 a year, making his remuneration \$1,500.

Appropriations as recommended by the Finance Committee were unanimously approved by the Board, though there was some discussion of the \$25,000 appropriation for mosquito extermination. Objection to this devaloped, not through opposition to the cause, but from the fact that some members abserted that the money was not being spent judiciclously. The fact that the big taxpayers of Atlantic City, who pay the biggest portion of the county taxes, were in favor of continuing the work, was largely responsible for the

Board's approval of the appropriation. Bids for paving the Meadow Bonlevard from Pleasuntville to Atlantic City were re ceived by the Board and the contract awarded to Edward L. Bader, the lowest bidder, for \$189,631.20. The bidding was very close, the next highest bid being only \$400 more. Appropriation of \$30,000 for a site for an

mory for Company L, in Atlantic City, was deferred, in order that a special committee may confer with the Company's officials with a view to securing a less expensive site than the one which has been proposed on South New York Avenue.
