A the same time, if other aspirants, or their sup porters, feel that so much haste is necessary which view I understand has resulted in the circulation of nominating petitions, naturally meaning more or less solicitation, then I feel to my friends, who unselfishly in terested themselves in my behalf, that my position should likewise without delay be clearly defined.

I shall be a candidate at the Primaries for the Republican Gubernatorial nomination.

I have reached this conclusion only after: careful survey of existing conditions through the State. "I deem it not improper to point to my seven years record in the Legislature, as indieating my interest in aggressive, constructive legislation, but shall not now attempt to go into detail, as to the successful fight I assisted in waging for Workmen's Compensation, for my and Efficiency, for consolidation in State government, and many other matters leading up to the partial application of accepted business principles to State manage-

"The work is far from completed and I only may briefly at this time that I desire to be Governor, not alone to gratify a personal ambition, but primarily to carry to a conclusion, as far as is possible, the Economy and Effi clency program in all its ramifications; like wise to make workable a complete budget avatem, through which a revised and modern ized financial control can be developed, until the State of New Jersey's \$15,000,000 annual business will be conducted from a business man's standpoint, with the Governor the re sponsible business manager of the State, rather than the mere political leader of his party. thoroughly appreciate the necessity for proper organization and leadership in politics, as i business, but that organization must be for service, rather than partisanship.

" It is my earnest belief that no man should be an aspirant for Governor without a clear and definite program, nor without being prepared to take the public into his confidence in this and other respects.

"My activity in the Legislature has been directed with the hope that I could see Nev Jersey a real business proposition with the main responsibility of the Governor being Organisation, who tendered him a testimonial that of conducting the affairs of the State with all the opportunities for good, rather than the mere filling of a few offices, seemingly his most important accepted function.

The reason he started on the exception of one jury, for the day, before noon. fruit was that he found that after the farmers shipped produce into market, the commission men would pay them any price they saw fit. His object was to have the growers ship at least flye carloads a day to the market in New York and then allow him to sell them at auction, causing the different commission men who wished to purchase not only to pay the top price per barrel, but also to set an average price for the apples sold by the com mission men as well as through the auction The results were good but growers did not ship nough and buyers found the supply exhausted too soop. The same plan was tried with peaches, proving very satisfactory.
