

ECONOMY PROGRAM BEGIN BY REDUCING EXCESSIVE SALARIES

REPUBLICANS WILL KEEP PLEDGES TO RETRENCH PUBLIC EXPENSES \$200,000 CUT OFF BY BILLS

Legislature Starts Energetic, Business-Like Session and No Unnecessary Appropriations Will Be Made—State To Get Million By Godfrey's Plan—No Free List For Legislative Bills

That extravagance forced upon the State by recent Democratic Legislatures are to be reduced to the minimum by the Republican majority which will take office Monday night when the Legislature of Atlantic County is called to order.

Some of the reductions set forth in the bill are: The salary of the Governor is cut from \$10,000 to \$8,000. The Governor will retain, however, \$300 a year for services as the State House Commissioner with the same salary \$10,000.

One of the planks in the Republican platform last fall was the reduction of salaried salaries and on the Republican majority has been based to carry out this pledge in an evidence of good faith that should increase the confidence of the voters in Republican principles and Republican methods of administering the affairs of the State.

The Economy and Efficiency bills show a saving of a little more than \$250,000, so that in all at least \$200,000 annually will be cut from the expenses of running the State if all of these bills are passed.

INCORPORATE TO FIGHT POUND NET FISHERMEN

Preservation of Sport Along Shore Object of New Organization. For the purpose of creating a vigorous war against pound net fishing along the coast of this State, the Hook and Line Fishermen's Protective Association of New Jersey was incorporated in the office of the Secretary of State at Trenton Monday last.

The purpose of the organization is set forth in the certificate of incorporation, as follows: "The object of the organization is to protect the fishery on the inland and tidal waters of the State of New Jersey; to seek for the enactment of laws to abolish pound nets and other similar systems and contrivances which are rapidly diminishing the numbers of the fish which permanently or temporarily dwell in the inland and tidal waters of the State and thereby prevent the destruction of all fishing in such waters; to seek for the enactment of laws which will insure for all time to the people of the State of New Jersey a ample supply of fish for food purposes; to assist in the conservation and enjoyment of the citizens and the inhabitants of the State of New Jersey and their guests and visitors, etc."

SIX THOUSAND VERDICT FOR FARMER'S DEATH

Molihari Was Struck By Express At McKee City Grade Crossing—\$1,000 Balm For Boy Killed By Auto.

Damaged in the amount of \$6,000 against the West Jersey and Seashore Railroad were awarded Tuesday last by a jury, before Judge Howard Carrow, to Frank and Paul Molinari, administrators for the estate of Vincenzo Molinari and his son, who were killed at a McKee City grade crossing on August 31, 1913, when an electric express struck their wagon.

FARM DEMONSTRATION NOTES

Written by the Farm Demonstrator of Atlantic County. It is very urgent that the farmers this year should be very careful in the selection of their seed potatoes. It is recommended that they buy only seed that has been inspected. The past summer the much dreaded Powdery Mildew and European Wart Diseases were found in this country, and the Experiment Station sends out a warning to all potato growers to treat their seed before planting.

How Old is May's Landing? A few years ago a public celebration of the 200th anniversary of May's Landing settlement was proposed, but abandoned after Mr. A. M. Heston, probably the best versed man in early South Jersey history, advanced facts tending to show that May's Landing was not two hundred years old. There seems to be a good deal of doubt about the earlier history of this region, but the following note, taken from the columns of the Record of February 25, 1908, seems to throw some light on the subject.

MAGNIFICENT OLD OAKS PRIDE OF MAY'S LANDING

Survivors of "Forest Primaval" On Egg Harbor's Shores. From its earliest days May's Landing has been noted far and wide for its beautiful oak trees; giant, rugged old survivors of the primitive forest that once stood along the shores of the Great Egg Harbor. It is interesting to find the first settlers two hundred years ago invaded this region, wandering tribes of Leni Lenape Indians, who planted their rude tents along the stream and found therein abundance of fish and clams to supplement their forest quarry.

Some of these trees have undoubtedly stood since the foot of the white man first passed this way and from the unusual locations in which many are found, it is not surprising on the highway, it may well be said that the town has grown up around them. The courses of avenues have been laid to avoid conflict with their domain and even houses seemingly erected to suit their convenience. The result has been advantageous to the community at large and beneficial in many ways to those who spared these vestiges of the forest. For what can more enhance the exterior of a home than the appearance of a neighborhood tree, dignified and stately?
