FARM DEMONSTRATION Random Paragraphs From Newspaper

Good Work Being Done Throughout State And Value Is Increasing-In No Wise Conflicts With Vocational Schools, Which Train Youth

Great results have been accomplished by farm demonstration work throughout New Jersey and the value of the work will increase from year to year. It is predicted that every agricultural county in the State will soo follow the example of the eight hundred counties in other states that have adopted the

There is no conflict between the work of the Farm Demonstration department and that of the Vocational Schools. The former is designed to give practical aid to the farmer in his work and the latter to train the youth, so that the great majority of boys who now leave the nome farm for the city will see their opportunity in progressive agriculture and adopt as their life work the tilling of the soil.

Farm demonstrators are, in fact, agents of the state and national departments, all the esources of each, in the way of expert advice, etc., being at their command. Through the strator these departments are brought in direct contact with the farmers, in a manner that gives the best possible results. As President Frelinghuysen, of the State Board of Agriculture, recently said, the demonstrator "is the recognised agent of the county in the support of everything that makes for rural better-

Nine counties in New Jersey have adopted Farm Demonstration and it is groving rapidly in popularity and results. The State is assisting the work by a \$15,000 appropriation. The first county to adopt the idea was Sussex; which was followed by Mercer, Bergen, Atlantic, Cape May, Burlington, Cumberland, Monnouth and Middlesex. The product of hundreds of farms in these countles has been enlarged, marketing systems adopted, animal and plant diseases checked and farming made to pay for scores who were getting little or n return for their hard work.

MAY'S LANDING SPORTSMEN ADVISE DEER LAW CHANGE

Would Have Season Open Later And Permit Hunting With Dogs.

At a meeting of May's Landing sportsmer held Saturday evening last in the Fire House, it was unanimously decided to recommend to the game laws permitting the use of dogs in in the season, to the last Wednesday in Octobe and the first four Wednesdays in November. The hunters contended that the presen method of hunting deer is inhumane and dangerous. Their experience has been that almost as many wounded animals get away as those which are captured, many of them dving slow deaths in the woods where their skeletons are afterward found. All were agreed that hunting with hounds would be better trailed and killed and would make the sport a much safer one to follow.

As for the season, there was general complaint that last Fall it opened much too early, the leaves still being on the trees and the weather too warm. There was considerable discussion whether the one day a week season was better than five consecutive days, the majority of the gunners holding to the former. County Solicitor E. A. Highee has drawn up a bill incorporating the changes recommended in the Assembly next week by the county representatives. What its fate will be is probematical. The Fish and Game Commision who have apparently "got the Legislature by the nose" to use the expression of one sports man in the matter of game laws, have heretofore been opposed to hunting with dogs, contrary to the experience of hundreds of old

GODFREY BILL TO RESTORE DOWER AND CURTESY RIGHTS

Aims To Replace Law That Existed Prior To Last Legislature's Act.

Assemblyman Carlton Godfrey has intro amends the act of the last Legislature abolishing the rights of dower and curtesy. There State-wide disapproval of the last Legislature's act. in passing such a radical measure and through the Godfrey bill, if passed, dower and curtery will be restored. The statement accompanying the Godfrey bill reads as follows:
