He is alleged to have immediately returned to the saloon and entering by a side door to have shot Wanser as the latter was crossing the floor of the rear room where the first encounter occurred. Wanser died almost immediately and Harris was disarmed by the angry crowd that witnessed the affair.

The present legislative inactivity at Washington is due rather to the impending change of administration than to any animosity between the Legislative and Executive branches of government, and there is no likelihood of any legislation other than appropriation bills until President-elect William H. Taft has Congress. From speeches made since his election it is evident that Mr. Taft will administer the duties of the office in a conservative manner. His recommendations will be made only after thorough investigation of all interests involved, and will not be radical nor contain any startling suggestions. The inauguration of the new administration will cause a general resumption of activity throughout the country; industrial interests will resume operations when they find no radical changes are contemplated, and general business conditions will improve. Changes will be made in the tariff, but they will not be made immediately, nor until Mr. Taft has become familiar with every side of the question. His recommendations to Congress will be made in a judicious manner, and will point the way for legislation along intelligent lines, with the general welfare of the country in view.

There are many improvements that could be made to beautify the appearance of May's Landing with the co-operation of property owners. What effect such an improvement would have on the appearance of the municipality can easily be conjectured, to say nothing of its practical value.
