

HARRIS WILL BE TRIED FOR MURDER OF WANSEN

TRIAL TO BEGIN TUESDAY
BEFORE TRENCHARD.

County Clerk Subpoenas Two-
Score Witnesses — Prosecutor
Goldenberg Has Strong Case
Against Defendant.

Under indictment for the murder of Albert Wanser in Atlantic City last October, Thomas A. Harris, colored, will be arraigned in court Tuesday before Justice Thomas W. Trenchard and Law Judge E. A. Higbee to stand trial for his alleged crime. He will be defended by the lawyers John J. Crandall and Isaac H. Suttler.

The trial is expected to last two days at least and will attract considerable attention. The

The murder of which the prisoner Harris stands accused is alleged to have been committed in a saloon at Balic and Pennsylvania avenues, Atlantic City, on Halloween night, 1900. Harris was sitting with a woman friend at a table in the saloon, when the victim, John J. Harris, entered. The latter is said to have passed a remark of an offensive nature as he passed, causing the other man to get angry and report it to the proprietor. As a result, the words passed and Harris was ejected only to come back with a club, it is alleged. Again he was ejected, but he returned a second time to have gone to his lodgings and borrowed a shotgun from his landlady on the plea that he wanted to go gunning the following day. Harris

is alleged to have immediately returned to the saloon and entering by a side door to have shot Wanser as the latter was crossing the floor of the rear room where the first encounter occurred. Wanser died almost immediately and Harris was discerned by the angry crowd the
