## MORE DONE THAN FOR MERLY AT HALF-WAY POINT OF SESSION

## CLAMOR FOR 'VOTES FOR WOMEN'

Committee Appointed To Codify  
Road Laws—Obnoxious Fishing  
License On Way To Discard—  
Local Option Question Scheduled  
To Come Up During Next  
Week's Meeting.

This week's session of the Legislature saw more real progress made in the work to be accomplished than was generally expected before half-way point of the legislative term has been passed. This is no more than was to be expected after witnessing the earnest and business-like opening two weeks ago.

The legislative feature of the week was furnished Monday when the suffrage amendment was given an airing. The representatives of the suffragettes and the anti-suffragists in force offered a considerable display of forensic effort that appears to be a waste of time in view of the fact that both parties are pledged in their respective platforms to pass an amendment that will place the matter for decision before the voters of the State next Fall.

Senator Gaunt of Gloucester will head the special committee to codify the State road laws. Senators Ogden and Marten are the other members of the committee. So much mismanagement has been shown in the administration of the road department affairs as at present conducted that many changes are likely to result in the work of this committee.

The bill, passed by the last Democratic session that placed a tax on all persons who desired to fish within the borders of the State, and which has aroused much general adverse criticism especially in the rural districts, may be repealed. Assemblyman Weart of Mercer has introduced a repealer which has already been given liberal endorsement.

Next week promises to be full of interest and excitement with its schedule of local option, women's suffrage and Economy and Efficiency bills as paramount issues.

## BOURGEOIS RULED OFF BOARD IN WEYMOUTH TWP. CONTEST

Commissioner Decides He Never Had  
A Voice In School Affairs.

That Anderson Bourgeois was at no time a member of the Board of Education of Weymouth Township and that the Board in whole he took part was not the legal Board, was the decision which Assistant Commissioner of Education J. B. Betts handed down Wednesday, straightening out the tangled affairs of the township, where two boards of education were each claiming to be the proper body to administer the school affairs.

While Commissioner Betts had not forwarded his opinion to the attorneys of the contestants as yet, in a letter to Attorney Charles C. Babcock, who with Attorney Albert C. Abbott represent the Mitchell faction, he stated that he will decide the case in their favor. He says in part:

"The decision will be that Mr. Bourgeois at no time was a member of the Board of Education of Weymouth Township and that any action by the members of the Board acting with him was null and void for the reason that at no meeting was there a quorum of the legal members."

The decision of Mr. Betts will mean that the faction headed by Bourgeois will be ousted from the administration of affairs and that represented by their opponents or the Mitchell faction will be in control.

During the contest between Mitchell and Bourgeois for supremacy the battle became rather warm. Bourgeois brought a suit asking for \$600 damages against Mitchell claiming false arrest and imprisonment. This suit grew out of the arrest of Bourgeois on a warrant sworn out by Mitchell who claims that the former had been trespassing on the schools' property. The suit, it is said, was dropped when Mitchell resigned as Clerk of the Board.

Judge Shinn Named For Term.  
Governor Fielder Monday last appointed for the full term Judge C. C. Shinn, of the County Criminal Court.

Judge Shinn was appointed by Governor Fielder to succeed former Judge Clarence L. Cole when the latter resigned several months ago. For years he has been an ardent Democrat, and when it became known that Judge Cole was to give up his office, the names of several local Democrats were mentioned for the job. Friends of Shinn, then president of the County Board of Taxation, rallied to his support, and after several trips to Trenton, succeeded in landing the plum for him.

Protest Game Killing.

Federal officials of the Agricultural Department, according to late reports, have sent a protest to Ernest Napier, president of the New Jersey Fish and Game Commission, against the plan, offered as a means of preventing forest fires, to permit the killing of deer and rabbits at all times of the year. The Federal officials declare that this course would be in direct antagonism to the policy of every State. The idea comes from the State Forestry Board.

The communication was sent by T. S. Palmer, chief of the game preservation bureau of the Agricultural Department. He points out that the policy proposed would lead to the extermination of both animals in the State.

Suit Over Strip of Land.  
A jury Wednesday returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiff in the suit of Dr. James North against George Abbott, to gain possession of 15 inches of land. Dr. North, who resides at Tennessee and Memorial Avenues, sold to George Abbott a plot of ground as a part of his property. The Abbott's Dairy plant is situated on the plot, and on the South east side Dr. North alleged that the defendant company's building lapped over 15 inches on his land.

Nesbit Settles With Workman.  
During the trial of the suit of Richard J. Dalton, in the Circuit Court, Wednesday against John J. Nesbit to collect damages for injuries he alleged he received through the negligence of the defendant, settlement was reached before the case went into the hands of the jury. Dalton was working for Nesbit erecting a building and was injured by falling material.

Struck By Wagon: \$750 Damages.  
Damages in the sum of \$500 were awarded to James Nesbit by a jury in the Circuit Court Tuesday against the American Ice Company for injuries which the 14-year-old son of the plaintiff received several years ago when an ice wagon belonging to the defendant backed into him. Five hundred dollars damages were given to the father and \$500 to the boy.
