A Child Wonder.

The French Academy of Sciences in 1721 examined the case of a French lad only seven years old who, in all respects save that of intelligence, was the equal of a man of twenty. His remarkable physical development began when he was two years old. At four he could do the farm work of a boy of fifteen or sixteen, and at seven he was a fully grown man. Although his physique was thus remarkably developed, his intelligence was no greater than that of children of the same age. He died before he was twenty. As is usual in such cases of premature development, his strength faded away and he became prematurely old before other men would attain maturity.

Too Much For Him.

A middle-aged failure once got a summer job in a Vermont general store. A boy came in one morning and asked him for a half-pound of melted maple sugar, the famous Vermont dainty, at the same time laying a pot on the counter. The inefficient failure, with out weighing the pot first, ladled a full of the sticky stuff into it, then, of course, when he set the pot on the scales, it went down with a bang. An Unwitting Executioner.

During the Boer war of 1881 one of the sentries of a British regiment, having been found asleep at his post, was tried by court martial and condemned to be shot. At the appointed time he was marched to a spot outside the camp, and the troops were drawn up to witness the execution of the unfortunate man. Just as the officer in charge was about to give the order to fire a bullet flew into the group of officers and men, and the prisoner fell dead at their feet. The shot was from the rifle of a concealed Boer marksman. In "sniping" the British troops he had unwittingly acted as executioner.

Origin of Oxtail Soup.

During the reign of terror in Paris in 1793 many of the nobility were reduced to starvation and beggary. The abattoirs sent their hinds fresh to the tanneries without removing the tails, and in cleaning them the tails were thrown away. One of the noble legions asked for a tail, and it was willingly given to him. He took it to his lodging and made what is now famous the first dish of oxtail soup. He told others of his good luck, and they enjoyed the tanneries so much that a price was put upon them.

Men and Children First.
