State sanction and support, to the extent of one-third at least and possible one-half of the cost, was assured Thursday by State Road oner Stephens to the members of the Bridge Committees of the Atlantic and Cape project of linking the two countles by a bridge Plano Solo... across the Great Egg Harbor Bay from Solo........... final link in the Ocean Highway which will establish an unbroken line of fine boulevards and bridges from one end of the New Jersey onat to the other.

Commissioner Stephens was more than favorable to the project—even entitusiastic over the question, and will lend every possible assistance to the Boards in bringing about the Dixon Jerome, of l'Ittaburgh, his twin brother, early construction of the big span. During the coming week the County Engineers of both counties will make soundings across the Bay to ascertain the depth of soft bottom and next Friday Stephens will meet them at Somers' Point to go over the result of their work and come to an agreement on the best kind of a structure to erect. The Commissioner is firmly in favor of a first-class bridge, one that will endure for years to come and not be a constant expense on account of repairs.

Stephens met the Bridge Committees, together with Capt, Samuel E. Perry, representing the Hotelmen's Association of Atlantic City, Mr. R. P. Risley, of Stone Harbor, and others interested in the bridge in the committee room of the Senate Thursday afternoon and the project was discussed in a thorough manner by the members, the engineers and the Commissioner. In relation to the project of a bridge between Ocean City and Somers' Point, Commissioner Stephens said positively that the State would give no aid to that span as it was purely a local enterprise, of benefit to Ocean City, and that the people of that city Beazley's Point route, he said, was the only one consistent with the Blate Highway system and the best for the Counties of Atlantic and Cape May at large. It was pointed out that he State Highway is five miles from Atlantic City and similar distances from other seacoust resorts and that Ocean City was approximately the same distance as the rest.

COUNTY MAY LIMIT WEIGHT.

Can Avoid Responsibility For Heavy Trucks Crashing Through Bridges.

Through a suggestion made Thursday by sioner Stephens at Trenton to the Bridge Committee, it is likely that the Board of Freeholders will place signs at the various bridges on the County roads specifying the weight of trucks and other vehicles that may afely go over the spans. If this is done, a truck weighing more than the amount set forth cannot collect damages if it goes through the bridge and may itself become liable to damages for breaking the span.

There seems, to be no limit to the extent of weight big auto trucks may carry, Commissioner Stephens, except the Freeholders take this measure. The present bridges were not built to carry such burdens as are now taken across them by some of the larger trucks, and while they may be so built in the future, the County cannot be expected to rebuild all its bridges in a few years, Highs have been placed on many of the bridges in North Jersey designating the extent of a load, that may be safely taken across.

"There are two kinds of justice that the peo ple desire and are entitled to have," says the ocellor, "One, even and exact der the administration of able and honest Judges. The second is secured only by having udges enough to try the cases, no matter what

the kind or name of court. "The Court of Chancery is a court of first in stance, the practice and proceedings of which with few exceptions, are extremely simple, as befits a Court of Conscience. The plendings are inartificial statements of the litigants' causes of action and defense. There is a single appeal to the Court of Errors and Appeal so that, with judges enough speedily to hear and determine the cases the litigants may be afforded speedy justice. A Child Wonder.

The French Academy of Sciences in 1729 examined the case of a French lad only seven years old who, in all respects save that of intelligence, was the equal of a man of twenty. His remarkable physical development began when he was two years old. At four he could do the farm work of a boy of fifteen or sixteen, and at seven he was fully grown man. Although his physique was thus remarkably devel ped, his intelligence was no greate than that of children of the same age He died before he was twenty. As he usual in such cases of premature de velopment, his strength finded away and he became prematurely old before other men would attain maturity.

Too Much For Him.
