AFRAID NOISE WILL IN TERFERE WITH THEIR BUSINESS

Belated opposition that developed vesterday wealthy hotel owners of Atlantic City, who through counsel declare that they believe the sound of guns will injure their business and propose to fight the establishment of the big Bethlehem Steel industry here, is not expected to halt the development of the big tract along the river which will undoubtedly be the biggest industrial establishment in Atlantic County if not in the entire Bouther section of the State. The hotel owners showed their hand yesterday when the six road surveyors appointed by the Court to close old woods oads lying within the tract met at the Court House prior to viewing the roads.

Ex-Judge C. L. Cole, counsel for the Bethle hem Steel, only subjected the counsel for the "Do any of your clients own any land in the

vicinity of the roads we propose to close? They were obliged to answer that they do not All the roads lying within the big tract purchased by the Bethlehem Steel Company, with one exception, are to be closed if the wishes of the company prevail. The exception is the road leading to the Danenhour property at this end of the tract, which is on this side of the proving grounds and is therefore to be left

Counsel for the hotel owners said this was the first opportunity they had to express their opposition, but it was pointed out by those in charge of the operations that the Board of Conservation and Development held a public hearing last Spring, before the State consented to sell the forest reserve tract along the river, when citizens of May's Landing and vicinity appeared in person and also presented a big petition asking the State to sell. The newspapers contained advance accounts of this earing and the hotel owners at that time had handsome, the predominating color being a an excellent opportunity to raise objections, but none were offered.



Schwab, head of the Bothlehem Steel Com pany, has just written a book entitled, " Buc ceeding With What You Have," (The Century Co.) in which he diagnoses the causes of es and failure and gives some interestin information regarding the inner workings of the Bethlehem direle. "For thirty-six years," writes Mr. Schwal I have been moving among workingmen in what is now the biggest branch of American ndustry, the steel business. In that time it has been my good fortune to watch most of the present leaders rise from the ranks, ascend step by step to places of power. These men. am convinced, are not natural prodigies. They won out by using normal brains to think be yond their manifest daily duty.

"There is not a man in power at our works to-day who did not beg'n at the bottom and work his way up, round by round, simply by using his head and his hands a little more freely and a little more effectively than the men beside him. Eugené Grace, president of Bethlehem, worked in the yard when I first knew him. Mr. Snyder was a stenographer. Mr. Mathews a draftsman. The fifteen men in direct charge of the plants were selected no because of some startling stroke of genius but because, day in and day out, they were doing little unusual things-thinking beyond their

possible. proposed State Highways System and the method of austaining it through a direct tax. The need of better roads in New Jersey and a comprehensive system of control and maintenance has been acknowledged for a long time, and it is a general opinion that the Edge people of New Jersey are willing to pay for good roads and they feel the direct tax is more businesslike than a bond issue. Easex County has suggested that assistance be given for the maintenance of roads through municipalities which might be included in the routes of the to the bill being amended to provide for this

suggestion being carried out. Opposition to the increase of the tax on utilities developed as was expected, but nothing was brought forth strong enough to cause any change of mind as to the advisability of passing the bill. The chief protest came from the smaller companies in the State on the claim that they did not pay dividends under the present existing conditions and that there fore the proposed increase would be a hardship to which they should not be seked to submit. At subsequent hearings the claims of these small companies will be fully exam-

ined and duly considered. Investigation of conditions at the State Prison has proceeded with more than usual vigor and seems to have strength-fied the opinion that the abolition of contract labor will be one of the results of the work of the investigating committee. There has been considerable talk of removing the State Prison from Trenton, but in view of the expense attached to such a move the opinion prevails that such action will not be taken—at least not immediately. It seems certain that more convicts will be put at work on the farm and that every effort will be made to make the farm a paving proposition.
