outer Charles Moore, consenting to the granting of a new trial, said the State felt that the circumstances a retrial was advisable. "While there are some cases tending to show that the court would be justified in refus ing a new trial," said Mr. Moore, "I do not care to be put in the position, as prosecutor, of upholding a verdict reached after all that has happened. I do not want the State to be aced of any unfairness in this matter and I consent to the motion for a retrial, not because I feel that the strict interpretation of the law demands it so much as a desire to remove any suspicion of unfairness to the defendant."

Terry's attorneys sought to have the retrial set off until another term, alleging as their reason that "the present of panel of jurors has russion of the case it would heard so much dis be unfair to the defendant to have them try him." Judge Sinn said the State would be placed in as much jeopardy by the discussion of the case as the defense, but assured counsel that none of the jurors who tried the first case would be permitted to serve in the second.
