It was passed by the Senate unanimously, sixteen Senators voting for it and none against it.

Under the present form of the Geran law, it is necessary, in this County for Instance, for voters who have removed from one election district to another since registering to travelse May's Landing and get transferred by Judge Cole before they can cast their vote.
