TWO MURDER CASES LISTED FOR NEXT WEEK

JURIES TO BE DRAWN FROM SPECIAL PANELS.

Result of Bar Room Brawl and Quarrel Over Sandwich-Both Defendants Colored-Week In Criminal Court.

Juries for two homicide cases 'listed for trial Tuesday next have been drawn. The talesman comprise members of the regular petit jury panel and have been summoned by Sheriff Ingersoll to appear Tuesday to serve in the murder trials before Justice Samuel

The first case to be moved will be that of Joseph Wright, colored, charged with the murder of Pearley Adams, also colored, during an altereation over a randwich. It is alleged that Wright, who ran a lunch wagon, shot Adams during a quarrel over payment for a sandwien,

The second case will be that of Joseph Nickens, colored, who will be tried for the murder of John McDevitt during a brawl in

Walter Coulin, charged with an assault on Camillo De Angelo with a pitchfork, was found guilty Monday last before Judge Higbee, with a recommendation for mercy. The affair started from an altereation because some ashes from a cart Coulin was unloading blow into De Angelo's face. The latter asked the driver to halt until he got past, which started an argument and led to a "plich-fork battle." The Italian had to go to the hospital to have his wounds dressed.

Bilas Cobb, an eighteen-year-old colored youth with a long record in the police court, was found guilty Monday of attempted burglary, one of the members of his "gang," Willlam Barrett, turning State's evidence against him. Cobb's method was to enter a store early in the evening during business hours and unfasten a window so he could get in later to rob the place. He was caught going through a window,
