The threat was that the Wilson Overlordship in New Jersey affairs would be continued from Washington; that the President of the United States would return in person to his adopted State to whip into line those Democrats who set their judgment in State politics against his judgment; that, if necessary, the power of the national Democratic organization would be directed to this

Sensational flourishing of the "big stick," Intended to strike terror into the hearts of those Democratic legislators who had declined to "rubber stamp" the Governor's measure aroused a feeling that it is difficult to describe Executive dominance had exceeded the limit : even the more subservient felt their manhood and judependence stirring. The threat that the Overlord would bound them to political doom if they did not vote to take from the Sheriff, a constitutional officer elected by the people of the county, the power to draw Grand and Petit Juries and hand it over to the Governor's appointees, was regarded as bossism

The new atmosphere of independence was noticable in the Benate as well as in the House Not content with distributing to his favorites the offices becoming vacant up to the last ent of his occupancy of the Executive office, Governor Wilson seized upon and dispensed nearly all the patropage that would naturally fall to his successor. Acting Governor Fielder. Vacancies that will not occur for weeks or months after he has ceused to be Governor were filled in advance by sending nominations to the Senate,

Instead of abolishing offices in the interest of economy and efficiency, this Democratic Leglalature is creating new jobs, raising salaries and kniffing Civil Bervice protection to chiefs of police in small towns. Democratic Leader Davis in the Senate openty declared in favor of the spotts system. He struck a blow at Civil Bervice by introducing a bill taking all appointees of Mayors and of Prosecutors of the Pleas out of the classified service.

Governor Wilson has falled to put through his program, announced with a flourish when the Legislature met, seven weeks ago. The program included anti-trust bills, grade cross ing ellinination, a constitutional convention lary reform, tax reform, and the secondary choice of candidates. He expected to get al this legislation passed and have the Legisla ture adjourn sine die before he went to Wash ington. By vigorous use of the steam rolle the "seven sisters" were put through. That is about the only trophy Governor Wilso carries with him to Washington. The Legislature will remain in session another month at least. Relieved of the Wilson Overlordship it will perform in a constitutional and legitimate way its duty as the law-making branch

The Legislature will hold no session during inauguration week. Interest will be centere on Washington. But the following week there will be lively doings at Trenton. 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
