The later bill was not so greatly different from the bill that was passed Tuesday, but it was an effort by the Democrats to secure, if possible, the credit for the passage of the measure. The net reads as follows:

"The governing body of any municipality within which a highway crosses or is crossed by a ratiroad, or any ratiroad, or any ratiroad company whose road crosses or is crossed by a highway, may bring its petition in writing to the board, alleging that public safety requires an alteration in such crossing, its ap prouches, the location of the highway or cross ing, the removal of obstructions to the sight, or the substitution of a crossing not at grade, whereupon the board shall appoint a time and place for hearing the petition, and shall give such notice thereof as it deems reasonable to persons and parties in Interest, and after such hearing, shall determine what alterations, and by whom made, and shall pass upon and will appear in next week's issue. approve the plans therefor.
