COTTON MILL IMPORTS MACHINERY FROM BRITISH ISLES

ELECTRIC POWER IS UTILIZED

Suction Conveyor From Wareand Insure Success.

Complete success has attended the installa-Company, of this place, of a nine-hundred foot suction tube for conveying cotton from the new warehouses, to the mill. This is the longest device of the kind in the world and is a great labor and time saving improvement. Instead of carting the cotton in bales from the railroad depot to the mill, the raw material is now delivered from the cars on a siding into the warehouse; where it is torn apart by an electrically-operated machine and drawn nine hundred feet through a tube, which dives under the county boulevard and skirts the shore of Lake Lenape, and is dropped into the first section of the mill, where it goes through a refining process before being spun.

Another new machine imported from En gland, has been installed in the warshouse through which cotton waste and cloth are run and reconverted to raw material, to be used for making new cloth. The new machinery is all operated by electric power furnished by the large new genera-tor recently installed, which required new boflers and other enlargements to the power plant. There are some who have rather unjustly secured the warden of being over-zealous, but these should bear in mind that had he not one ashore and found the dog and ascertained the owner, he would have been liable to real criticism for neglecting his plain duty. The fault appears to be entirely with the severity of the law, for under such circumstances the magistrate should be empowered, if he finds there has been no willful violation of the law,

Republicans Have Job On Hand To Meet Deficits.

depleted condition of State finance prought about by recent Democratic mismanagement was discussed at a joint confernce of the Republican legislators Tuesday. A report had been expected from New York experia who the Republicans have had to go over the accounts of State Comptroller Edwards, but this report was not ready.
