Inmates With No Remuneration.

The question of the appointment of a matron at the County Jail has been brought up in the Public Buildings Committee, on receipt of a complaint of the Women's Christian Temperance Union. This has been discussed of several previous occasions, but the number of women in the jall is usually so small that the appointment of a matron and establishment of quarters for her would entail an excessive

Mrs. Joseph R. Bartlett, the Union points out, is now filling the post of matron without any remuneration. During the past year otal of 65 women were confined in the jail, some of them for periods of 300 days. "These women," says the Union, "asses to use jail without a change of clothing and the things that women need and in many cases have no friends to provide such for them. When in need, it is their custom to send for the Sheriff's wife, who has given freely of her time to them

The Union points out that five counties, Mercer, Passaic, Essex, Hudson and Camden, also the Atlantic City lock-up, have matrons. While the matter has not been definitely de-olded, members of the committee fiel that Mrs. Bartlett can look after the needs of the women inmates in a much more econor manner than a matron and it is likely that the Committee will recommend that she be re numerated for her services.


