

APPROPRIATION GRANTED TO FIGHT MOSQUITOES

Burns' Bill Again Turned Down

For Expense.

At the regular monthly meeting held Wednesday last in Memorial Hall, Atlantic City, the Board of Freeholders again refused to pay the \$750 bill rendered by the William J. Burns Detective Agency for services rendered at the instance of the Attorney General in the concrete water case. The Attorney General, Joseph E. Burns, from the Attorney General's office, declared the doubtfulness of the claim against the County was conceded by the use of the words "may be liable," and from Prosecutor C. L. Goldenberg, who declared he had not authorized the expense and that the charges were "the next thing to highway robbery." Solicitor E. A. Higbee advised the board not to take action on the bill, which was referred to him for further investigation.
