Education Board Asks \$3,000 To Run Schools of Hamilton Township During Coming Year-Annual Meeting Tuesday Next.

On Tuesday evening next the annual school seeting will be held for the election of niem bers of the Board of Education and the appro priation of moneys to run the schools of the Township during the ensuing year. At this election there will be three trustees to elecand appropriations totalling \$3,000, recom mended by the Board, on which to vote.

The members whose terms expire are Clark B. Barrett and Charles H. Kears, of this place and Henry Pfeiffer, of Cologne, Whether these members will be candidates for re-clee tion or not has not been learned. An appropriation of \$500 will be necessary in

order to remodel the school house at Mizpah which has been condemned by the State Board of Education as it does not come up to the requirements of the Board for publi chool buildings.

There have been several rumors about tow that women candidates are in the field for members of the Board, but no such candidate has definitely announced this fact. Women, under the school law of New Jersey, are eligible to membership on the Board. A strange feature of the law, however, is the fact that women cannot vote for trustees, though they may vote on appropriations.

Under the act, governing boards of municipalities may present a petition to the public utility commission asking for the elimination of grade crossings in the municipality, and after a bearing for all parties at interest, the commission may order elimination of such crossings as it deems dangerous.

In a recent letter to the Ocean City Board of Trade the position of the State Road Commis sioner on the Bay bridge question is stated in pinin language. The letter, which is selfxplanatory, was as follows:

Mr. James M. Buvress, Proffeet Ocean City Board of Trade,

My Dear Sir: - I am in receipt this mornin f a letter signed by representatives of you Board of Trade, of the Young Men's Progre sive League and of the Ocean City Automobile Bridge Co., protesting against the passage of Benate Bill 100 as detrimental to the constrution of the Ocean City-Somers Point bridge,

I drafted the measure against which yo protest at the request of the Boards of Choser Freeholders of the Counties of Atlantic and Cape May, in order to allow of the State giving the State highway system. It is a matter of public knowledge that the

proposed bridge between Homers Point and Beesley's Point was one of the bridges contemplated in the construction and operation. In drafting this measure, I had in view the fact iffat various parties in Ocean City had undertaken the construction of a bridge from that municipality to Somers Point.

I carefully avoided anything that in my judgment, seemed to interfere with the project. Benator Wheaton introduced the Bill at my request and upon a statement of facts from me practically as set forth in this letter.

I am still unable to see wherein Benate Bill 100 can possibly affect the construction of the Ocean City - Bomers Point Bridge, unless it is necessary to secure a monopoly of the traffic in order to make the bridge an attractive in vestment.
