has been testing big guns, as high as eighteen inches, for several years, no damage has been done. Here the company has only a fifteen hundred foot range and has to fire into the side of a mountain, so flight tests cannot be made. The point I wish to make in regard to this Reddington ground is that within five hundred feet of the gun stand there is a large shell factory employing three hundred hands, working day and night. This factory building is enclosed on all sides by glass. This glass has never been broken by the concussion of the guns. Within the building are stored the highest explosives known, which aslight jar will explode. The guns at this point cannot be heard five miles away. "One reason for the safety of the factory

there is a deflecting wall, which protects the area back of the guns, and one of these walls will be erected at the May's Landing ground. The grounds at Sandy Hook and Cape May have no such wall. In addition to this wall there are natural barriers between the grounds and Atlantic City, including woods and hills as high as seventy-five feet, according to the State surveys. One way is the heavier fertilization of staples now getting little commercial fertilizer. Fertilizers have gone up, but not in compari son to the price of corn and wheat, An acre of good corn produces more food

value than any other farm crop. The acreage of corn, therefore, should be as large as can be made to increase the yield. 

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
