TWO EVILDOURS SENT TO STATE PRISON.

Jealous Negro Gets Twelve Years Six To Fifteen.

Jersey Justice was quickly meted out Tuesday last by Judge E. A. Higbee to a number of evildoers recently convicted and the windup of his term was marked by the Imposition of State Prison sentences on two colored offenders, James Perkins, who slashed Bessle ood, his common-law wife, with a razor, and Brodle Williams, convicted of highway robbery. The former was sentenced to a term of not less than six or more than twelve years and the latter not less than five or more than

Judge Higher said: "With one exception, the woman you so atroclously slashed with a mxor, presented the worst appearance of any I have ever seen. You lived with this woman although not married to her. In a rage of lealousy, or because she informed you that her love for you was a thing of the past, you cut her many times. Your are, indeed, fortunate, that you are not facing a charge of murder. In my nine years of dispensing justice, regardless of color or race of the accused, it has been my principle, where deadly weapons played a leading part, to inflict punishment upon the offender. I intend to follow my rule, and inflict severe punishment upon you. You displayed more brutality in your actions than in many cases of murder, where sometimes the act is done with the swiftness of one blow with an axe or similar instrument. Your slashes upon this woman were numerous and most deadly. I therefore impose the full penalty of the law upon you, that you serve no less than six and no more than twelve years at hard labor
