

Nearly every farm garden contains a few rose bushes, but generally these are allowed to grow at will, no pruning being done except when a few flooms may be cut. In con quence, these bushes are often straggley and inattractive in appearance.

There are three general types of roses grown in gardens, namely, the climbing roses, the soalled June roses, and the monthly roses. Climbing roses require very little pruning It is necessary only to out out dead or weal shoots. A good practice, however, is to out back the tips six or eight inches. This treat-

URGE FREEHOLDERS TO AID PENN MEMORIAL BRIDGE ON DELAWARE

OF VITAL IMPORTANCE TO ATLANTIC CITY SAY HOTELMEN

ABSECON ROAD BONDS ORDERED

Board Hears Complaint That Resort Suffers Through Lack Of All-Year Boulevard To Shore-Longfought Franchise Will Be Granted To Bell Telephone Company Over County Highways.

At an adjourned meeting of the Board of Precholders Wednesday last a resolution pro viding for a bond laune of \$300,000, as the countr's share towards the construction of the coop-Atlantic City Boulevard, was passed. The bonds will be in \$1,000 immes, \$15,000 expiring each year, the final payment being made in 1948. The State Road Commissioner has approved of the issue and authorised the payment of \$80,577.80 as the State's contribu ion under the state road act. The contract price for the road was \$290,821.25,

but this did not include the engineering, inction and several other contingencies which will be the total cost up to \$298,542.13 in the estimale of County Engineer Nelson. The bonds will bear five per cent, interest, payable on the first of April and the first of October of each year at the County Collector's office. They will bear the date of April 1, 1916. The first of them will expire in 1926. Another resolution was passed authorizing

the employment of an expert lumber man to inspect the creosote and timber prepared in Norfolk for the various bridges on the boulevard. It is estimated that this inspection will ost about \$1,000. The freeholders were urged by a committee from the Atlantic City Hotelmen's Association

headed by A. T. Bell, to appropriate \$5,000 for the preliminary surveys and plans of the prod Penn Memorial Bridge across the Delaware River from Philadelphia to Causden. It was urged that this bridge will be a great benefit to Atlantic County and Inc other counties have already signified their willingness to bear a proportionate share of the cost of the preliminary work, this county which will be so largely all shoulder a share of the expense.
