Senator Emerson L. Richards went to the Assembly Chamber after the bill was beaten and tried to swing enough votes to secure passage on reconsideration but, evidently could not get the pledges. He was bitterly angry at Mr. Runyon, and as he was leaving the House went to Mr. Runyon and said he proposed to denounce him on the Senate floor. Mr. Runyon told him to go ahead.

"Lobbying" defeated the bill, according to a statement of Senator Richards in last Sunday's Atlantic City Gazette. "In view of the national crisis and the unwillingness of the legislature to put any obstacle in the way of the preparations for a state of war, it was felt that this would have to be permitted, even though it caused some annoyance in the resort. Should, however, the events prove that the gun testing is working an injury to the resort, a constitutional nuisance, the courts are in jurisdiction proceedings are open and the testing can be stopped."

"There was no trouble after we got into touch with the Bethlehem people." William Hanstela, President of the Hotelmen's Association, made the following statement: "When the Legislature adjourned, that brought to a close the campaign to stop the proving grounds from being started. It seems to me that the members of the House were actuated by patriotic motives in voting against the Richards' bill. This is my opinion only. They were inclined to believe that the Government was in peril of entering the war and that the grounds would be of urgent need. I never did take much stock in the lobby against the bill. In my estimation, it moved the members to defeat the bill."

"Our recourse now is to the courts. If damage is inflicted we can collect it. The only trouble is that it will be difficult to prove the damage in money if the guns drive visitors away from us. That is a question which will be hard to settle. What money is lost will be made up by the State Company, who are the attorneys for the Steel Company, who are prepared willing to make any concession asked, they appeared to be fair. They seemed to desire to meet us halfway. We will have to wait and see what will happen."

ITEMS OF INTEREST TO COUNTY FARMERS

AGRICULTURE SUGGESTIONS AND RECENT RURAL HAPPENINGS

Small fruits for the home garden should be planted during the first half of April except in exceptionally backward seasons. The selection of varieties is often a perplexing problem for the amateur gardener, owing to the large number of varieties of each fruit.

The Agricultural Experiment Station recommends the following varieties of currants, gooseberries and raspberries. Wilder and Red Cross are both excellent varieties of red currant, being large, productive and of high quality.

Those desiring a white currant should plant the White Imperial, while the Black Champion is the standard in its class. Red Jacket and Columbus are varieties of gooseberries that produce an abundance of large fruit of excellent quality.

Ranere (St. Regis) and Cutbush, the former producing an early and late crop, are very good varieties of red raspberries, while Plum Farmer for an early yield and Cumberland for late will meet all demands for black caps.

Many inquiries are received at the State Agricultural College regarding the Spring sowing of alfalfa. Provided the late Summer Fall are moist and favorable August seedings in consideration of the winter wheat. Red alfalfa, if the soil is suitable Spring sowing is quite apt to be successful and may even be preferable on soils where Winter injury and heaving are destructive.

The simplest method is to sow the inoculated seed in Winter grain soil early, as clover is customarily sown. Sweet clover seems a little more likely to succeed in this way than alfalfa, and it is well to sow clover with the alfalfa, and to use about one quart of each. Alfalfa may also be seeded with oats or Spring barley about April 1. The oats should be sown lightly, about 1 1/2 bushels per acre, and is better if cut early for hay to prevent its robbing the alfalfa.

The firm seeded always desirable for grass may be secured by disking instead of plowing. The ground is bare and clean. The last method and the one which is most likely to show in April and continue to harvest every week or ten days until June 1 or later. This secures a clean, solid seed-bed well stored with moisture on which the alfalfa may be sown alone with excellent prospects of success.

Any one of these methods should furnish a light hay crop in August and the plants will be strong and well-rooted by Winter. One should always be sure of getting American grown seed and should not neglect thorough inoculation and liming, or results will certainly be disappointing.

The time to plant vegetables is at hand and everything should be in readiness. The different kinds and amounts of seed should be ordered, manure should be spread upon the soil and lime and fertilizer should be procured. The best varieties of vegetables, as recommended by the State Agricultural College, are given in this article and the preparation and fertilization of soil described.

The following varieties of vegetables are suggested because of their superior American heavy production, together with the amount of seed or number of plants for a row 100 feet long: asparagus, Giant Argenteo 10-year old roots;
