BOARD WILL SUBMIT PROPO-SITION TO VOTERS.

Necessary Improvements and Additions to Old Building Would Cost \$23,000 — Structure Must Comply With Law.

With the necessity of making improvements to the High School building involving an expenditure of \$23,000 at the lowest estimate before it for consideration, the Board of Education last night passed a resolution providing for the issuance of Township bonds to the extent of \$25,000 for the erection of a new High-School building, which will be submitted to the voters of the Township within two weeks for their approval.

The present buildings have been condemned by the State authorities as unsanitary and inadequate for the needs of the many pupils enrolled, and the defects must be remedied before next September. The penalty for noncompliance is the deprivation of the Township of all State appropriations for school purposes. According to the most conservative estimates, the additions and improvements to the present High School building demanded by the State will cost \$25,000. As a new faulding can be constructed, modern in every detail, for \$28,000, the Board decided that the latter proposition was the better and accordingly prepared a resolution for the issuance of bonds, to be paid off yearly after a period of five years. The requirements of the State in full are contained in the letters reproduced below:

Dear Sir: - Several complaints from citizens and taxpayers of your district having been entered in this office to the effect that the Hamilton Township Board of Education is not mrnishing "suitable school facilities" (see N. J. School Law, article X, section No. 126) for the children residing in the district and on roll in the classes held in three rented rooms, and the school building known as No. I, all located in May's Landing, therefore, I have caused these buildings to be carefully inspected and desire to report to your Board of Education the following conditions:

1. As the conditions surrounding the three rented rooms are virtually alike I find that as a whole they are totally unsuited for school purposes on account of the cross lighting, of an provision for a proper and equal ventilation. Tais) find that the sanitary arrangements for the convenience of the children, are not as prescribed by the School Law, therefore, I suggest that these rooms not be used for school purposes after the ending of the present school

- Timi the conditions surrounding School No. I are not in accordance with the intent . the law, and I would suggest that a modern and approved system of ventilation be installed therein; that the steam heating system be the proved so that the temperature of the rooms I can be equally adjusted to an even temperature; will probably be considered. that separate cloak rooms for each school room be added; that the cross lighting of the rooms be eliminated find that the sanitary closets in the rear of the school yard be protected with seven

foot close board fences as provided in the law. The elimination of the three rented rooms will make it necessary for your Board of Education to provide suitable accommodations either by an addition to the present building owned by the Township, or by the crection of a new building of sufficient capacity to care for all the children flow attending in the three rented rooms, or a new building to care for all the children of that section of the district now entitled to attend school in grades that are

established in the old building. In all I find that the complaints as entered in this office, are correct and institled, and I suggest that your Board of Education Take action to provide suitable school facilities and accommodations for the children, entitled by law to attend this school, before the opening of the school term in September 1907, in the manner suggested above. Plans and specifications for all alterations or new buildings should be submitted to the State Board of Education for suggestions and criticisms as required by
