# DEMOCRATIC FAILURE HAS WRECKED PARTY

LEADERS CONCEDE DEFEAT NEXT ELECTION.

Promised Reforms Sidetracked, State Moneys Lavishly Expended and Needed Legislation Ignored In Scramble of Office Seekers.,

A Democratic Legislature, elected last Fall by the people of New Jersey on their promise to give the State many reforms, came to sine die adjournment Thursday night, because of an Iron hand wielded by the Senate to force the House to quit the work of law-making in accordance with a concurrent resolution adopted two weeks ago, providing for final adjournment at 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon. The action of the Senate in the particular instance is without precedent in this State.

For two weeks the House and Senate have been at odds on the important platform pledges of the Domocratic party that were not put into statutes before Governor Wilson left the State to become President. Every effort to have the two law-making branches get together on Jury reform and constitutional conention laws failed uttorly, and because in the House the Smith-Nugent reactionaries gained control of members who started out to be Wiln men and then flopped to the old Demo cratte" gang." while the Senate followed the course the course outlined by President Wilson ns Governor.

It is the general impression among conser vative Democrats that the Smith-Nugent re actionaries of the Honse, piloted by Thoma Martin, of Rudson County, have dealt a death blow to Democratic power in the State because of the absolute refusal of the reactionaries to give the progressive legislation promised las

The influence of Governor Fielder to have the Senate continue work up until the time the House was ready to adjourn was sought by the House majority, and the Governor cor municated with the Senate to this end. This desire of the Executive was ignored, and in caucus the Senators decided to stand by their original purpose.

The cause of this drustic action by the Senate was the factles followed in the House on a number of important party measures, which were defeated 'entirely because of the total omination of the House by "Tommy

The Benate actually clubbed the House into ubmission, and when the House found that the Upper House meant business, it could do nothing but to get down to the business of winding up its work.

When the Benate was ready to quit for the session Benator Davis, the majority leader, life for a few years but got into politics again presented a resolution providing that all bills when he became the candidate for County at this time in committee and the president's desk should be deemed "dead" bills to be transmitted to the "morgue" in State library. This resolution killed more than 200 House bills, outright and rendered void every particle of work done by the House after 3 o'clock. This means that more than 100 bills passed by the House went by the Boards because of the absolate refusal of the Senate to have anything to do with them. The total of House bills killed by the drastle action of the Senate was un-

It was the intention of the liouse to hold up uge of tenate bills and of the appropriation bills to prevent adjournment of the Legislature. This course did not after the decision of the Senate in the least, and finally the House did the only thing left for it to do, surrender.

The House concurred in the Senate amenments to the mandatory legislation relating to smaller Bourds of Freeholders in this Blate. SAMUEL KIRBY LAID TO REST. Death of the Well Known Official Mourned Throughout County,

Following an illness of several months duration, County Clerk Bamuel Kirby, aged 58 years, passed away peacefully Friday evening of last week, surrounded by the members of his family, including two sisters, Mrs. Charles Evans and Mrs. J. J. Kersey. For forty-eight hours prior to his death the County Clerk was inconscious and the end was expected for many hours. His death has caused deep sorrow throughout Atlantic County, where he was known and beloved by a host of friends. Mr. Kirby was born in Glassboro, N. J., in 1855, his father being a prosperous farmer and merchant in that town, and until 1870 he was ssociated with his father in business. When be came to Atlantic County he went to the Senside Hotel, then owned and conducted by Shurles Evans, President of the Atlantic City National Bank, and remained, there until 1885, when he leased the Margate Hotel, since torn down, at Pacific and Mt. Vernon Avenues, and went into the hotel business for himself. Mr. Kirby was chief clerk at the Beaside Hotel

until he leased the Margate. About five years later Mr. Kirby gave up the Margate and returned to the management of the Beuside Motel, and remained there until was first elected Sherth in 1808. He took that office to succeed former Sheriff Smith E. Johnson, who in turn succeeded Mr. Kirby to that office, and who in turn was again succeeded by Mr. Kirby as Sheriff. During the interim between his two terms as Sheriff, Mr. Kirby married Mrs. Ross Jacobs, widow of the late Senator John C. Jacobs, of New York.

Mr. Lee continued to hold the office bowever, contending that his appointment by Governor Stokes had been for the entire up expired portion of Mr. Scott's term. Mr. Kirby ended that the Lee appointment was only only until the next election, at which he Kirby, had been elected. Mr. Lee declined to give up the office and when Kirby attempted to take possession of the office suit was rought to determine which of the two aspirants was the legal Clerk. After mouths of litigation the Courts awarded the office for the unexpired term to Mr. Kirby, and he took point. possession and when the original Scott term ran out he was re-elected without any serious
