Outbreak of War May Hold Up Water Power Co.'s Machinery,

Supt. Charles H. Kears and Mr. Harrison Wilson spent the week at Lynn, Mass., at the factory where the new power plant and electric motors for the cotton milliare being manufactured, becoming thoroughly acquainted with the construction of the new equipment. They are endeavoring to secure an early delivery of the machinery as the declaration of war will mean a long tie-up in its completion.

# GOVERNOR URGES ALL

PLANT EVERY VACANT PLOT -OTHER AGRICULTUAL INFORMATION

Governor Walter E. Edge Wednesday lent his official aid to the increase of vegetable growing in a proclamation designating Saturday, April 21, as Planting Day and the week following as Planting Week. He directs attenion to the urgent need of producing as great an abundance of crops as possible, in the face of the present national emergency, and asks old and young to co-operate to this end. Governor Edge directs that action be taken in every public school and by every municipal body to encourage agriculture and expresse his hope that every vacant plot of ground will

be utilized Governor Edge would have school children and older residents of the State join in growing food supplies to meet one of the econ questions which arise in warfare. He says that the strife will demand the expenditure of money and bring with it increased taxation.

To offset the burden he would have the cost of food stuffs reduced by a greater supply.

"The period is one of uncertainty," he de "There is no lack of confidence o patriotism, but the food raising economic question is not as clear and distinct as we would have it. One sure way of dishelling the mist and establishing that stability which we hould have is to increase the productivity of our farm lands."




