The Building Committee will meet with Architect 8, Hudson Vaughn during the present month and prepare plans of brick. to be submitted at the next meeting. The old buildings, creeted many years ago, are in a dilapidated condition and will be torn down as soon as the new buildings have been com-

In the matter of a resolution to have Bell Telephones installed in the offices of the Sheriff, County Clerk and Surrogate at May's Landing, Freeholder Smith did not fare so well, the Board emphatically refusing to do business with that telephone company in view of the warfare that has been carried on over a year owing to the refusal of the com pany to install free telephone service for official business. The "telephone war" has caused great inconvenience to the County officials as the Bell phones and they are obliged to leave their offices to answer the calls. This fact was soluted out by Freeholder Smith and also by Sheriff, R. H. Ingersoil and after considerable argument the Board voted to allow the Building Committee to have pay stations installed, provided the company would do it

Plans were adopted for the rebuilding of the Mullica River bridge, which is in a dangerous condition, Jointly with the Commissioners of Burlington County, who were present at the Board fliceting and held a conference prior thereto with the Bridge Committee. An effort vill be made to have the State bear a portion

Determination of the Board to go right shead with the project for a bridge across the Great Egg Harbor Bay from Bomers' Point to parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. Leiling. providing for immediate burings to be taken the bay. The borings will cost \$1,250 half of \ the expense to be borne by Cape May County, Freeholders from the latter were present and Bartha Saturday and Sunday last, announced the determination of Cape. In an opinion given at the request of Director Cyrus F. Osgood, Solicitor E. A. Higbee an nounced that the law enacted by the Legis lature making conviction of crime a cause of forfeiture of office, does not apply to Engineer E. D. Rightmire.

The Board voted to borrow money in anticipation of taxes for the use of the Mosquito Extermination Commisson, which is desirous of beginning its work immediately and for which no provision was made in the last tax budget. The Commission announced that the work will be started in Atlantic City.

The matter of giving prisoners confined in the County Jail work to do was brought before the Board. The concensus of opinion was decidedly favorable to the project, but it was feared the existing statutes will not permit the Innovation. A conference of the Committee on Discharge of Prisoners and the Grand Jury will meet to-day to discuss the project,

"Another important point to consider," Sheriff R. H. Ingersoll, who was present, "Is what to do with the discharged prisoner. Nine times out of ten he has to go back to the environments from which became and is given no help to lead a better life,'

A resolution introduced by Freeholder Smith, on behalf of the Building Committee, giving the Committee power to purchase filing cases and other supplies for the office of the County Prosecutor, met with such violent opposition that it was withdrawn for the time, but will probably be introduced in a different form at the next meeting. Prosecutor Moor met the Building Committee at their monthly meeting and requested that the County purchase a filing system for the preservation of County papers. The Committee was unanimpossly in favor of the proposition, but being in doubt as to their authority to equip this office, asked the Board to extend their juris-

GAME LAW IS CHANGED

Season For Quail and Rabbit Short ened-Deer Cannot Be Sold-Foxes May Be Hunted With Hounds On Permit.

The State Fish and Game Commission has ent out copies of the new laws pertaining to that department to the game wardens of the State, calling attention to those statutes in which there have been radical changes, and Fox. wardens are now familiarizing themselves with the new acts. Following are some of the mensures :

Assembly, No. 423, a supplement, allows foxes to be hunted with with hound and firearms from the last day of the open season until the 31st day of March, providing a permit is granted by the Fish Commission. This law regulates the season for killing quall, rabsquirrel, English ring-neck suffed grouse, prairie chicken, wild turkey or

Hungarian partridge, Assembly, No. 221, permits commissioners to sell, exchange or otherwise dispose of fish or eggs from the State hatchery when they deem proper, the proceeds to be turned into the State Treasury.

Assembly, No. 227, make it unlawful to sell

or offer for sale squirrels, wild deer, whether taken within or without the State; provided that unplacked carcasses of certain species of ducks and birds raised on game preserves in this State, or coming from another State or County, which are properly tagged by the State authorities, may be sold at any time for food purposes.

Assembly, No. 360, regulates the hunting of fur game and prohibits the use of artificial light; it also prohibits the use of gun or other firearms, but allows traps only, and from the 15th of November to the 1st of April, providing these animals do not destroy dams or canal banks; heavy fines are to be inflicted for steallog traps and animals

Benate, No. 68, prohibits the sowing of rye or other cereal, or other food in any salt waters within 400 feet of any ice, marsh or meadow. or heap of seaweed not covered with water, for the purpose of luring, decoying or baiting geese, duck, swan or brant so that the game may be shot at.

Assembly, No. 223, permits any person destring to engage in the business of raising and selling domesticated English ring-neck and other pheasants, ducks or deer in wholly inclosed preserve by making application in writing to the Fish Commission. This new law is a lengthy one, and it would, perhaps, be well for those anticipating a move in this direction to fully acquaint themselves with the act's provisions.

CHANCE FOR BOYS AND GIRLS. Gold Medal For Best Composition On Earth Roads.

A gold medal to the school boy or girl between the ages of 10 and 15 who writes the best composition, not to exceed 800 words, on the epair and maintenance of earth roads, is to be awarded by Lagan Waller Page, Director, Office of Public Roads, United States Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. All compositions must be submitted to Mr. Page before May 15, 1913; and the medal will be awarded as soon thereafter as the composition can be graded. The composition may be based on knowledge gained from books or other sources, but no quotations should be

Many children living in the rural districts have experienced the disadvantages of roads October by a proclamation of Mayor F. C made impassable through a lack of proper maintenance and it is expected that their interest in the competition will stimulate greater interest among the parents. Bad roads have prevented many children from obtaining a proper education and have even prevente doctors from reaching the side of rumi patients n time to save their lives,

Any child between the ages mentioned at tending a country school, may compete. Only one side of the paper must be written on; each page should be numbered; the name, age and address of the writer, and the name and location of the school which he or she is atending must be plainly written at the top of the first page. The announcement of the competition has been sent to the superintendents of schools in the rural districts. No further Public Roads. This announcement should be plain to everyone, and all children will thus start on a basis of equality.
