END CONTROVERSY OVER TUCKAHOE BOULEVARD

FREEHOLDERS WILL PAY BOURGEOIS DAMAGES.

Bids To Be Advertised For Soon As Commission Approves Plans And Building of Long Delayed Highway Commenced.

After a delay of two years resulting from ontroversies over the right of way, the Board of Freeholders and Anderson Bourgeols. member from Weymouth Township, reached an amicable agreement Wednesday last at the monthly meeting of the Board, whereby Bourgeois is to receive \$325 damages for land included in the right of way. The revised plan for the new road, which is to open a new route to the extreme South Jersey resorts including Ocean-City, Wildwood, Cape May and other watering places, will be submitted at once to State Road Commissioner and bids will be advertised for as soon as his approval is re-

The building of this highway will not only be bailed with delight by autolsta and greatly increase travel to the above named offics, but will be a boon to farmers living along its route. The money for its construction, which was raised by taxation, has been in bank drawing interest since the controversy

The Bould awarded the Nelson-Meredyth Co. a continct for the new bridge across the Patcong Creek, near Steelmanville, for \$31,400. This is the second time this firm was awarded a contract for brilding a bridge across this stream. The fire bridge was planned to cost \$38,190, but it was seclutorate that afterward the contract was received by consent of the company and new plans drawn to build a cheaper structure. By this action the Board of Freeholders saved the county \$6,790.

A contract was given the Art Metal Company for installing filing cases and additional furniture in the office of County Clerk for \$1,800, A contract was awarded to James Yates for building a tool house for the use of the County Road Supervisor on a lot rented by the county at a cost of \$670.

The Bridge Committee reported that the work on the bridge over Naked Creek, near Port Republic, had been completed by the Atlantic Construction and Supply Company. The Library Committee was authorized to subscribe for the Atlantic Reporter for the benefit of the Bench and Bar of the county. The volumes will cost \$12 and will be kept at the Court House in the care of the custodian of public buildings.

The Board revived the Albany Avenue In ide Thoroughfure bridge question, this being brought forward by the presentment of a report from the special committee appointed to investigate the advisability of rebuilding the present structure. Freeholder Willets, an Atlantle City member, suggested that the people who are vitally interested make known their views on the question. It is estimated that s new bridge will cost about \$100,000. The plan will be presented at the May meeting.

DISASTROUS FIRE AT HARBOR. Wrought Heavy Damages and Resulted in Death of One Persons

A disputrous tire which is thought to have originated from a locomotive spark Tuesday threatened to wipe out an entire city block. The home of County Superintendent H. M. Cressman, adjoining the burning buildings, and Aurora Hall, caught fire in several places and were saved with difficulty.

Shortly after the two o'clock express went by just Southwest of the house the roof was event. FIDDLED WHILE HOME BURNED. STRONG BID FOR SCHOOL

Gilbert's Station Palace Destroyed By ·Spectacular Midnight Blaze. Nero addled while Home was burning, and Committee of Ten Appointed At

Stephen Gilbert, a character about town, was Addling in a local barber shop last Saturday at midnight while his palace, better known as the old May's Landing and Egg Harbor City depot, which he has occupied as a home for wenty years, was destroyed by fire together with its contents. Gilbert ekes out a some what precarious livelihood by chopping wood, picking huckle-berries in senson and doing odd Jobs about town and is care-free, happygo-lucky in season and out.

Stephen knew nothing about the fire until it was nearly extinguished by members of Bellance Hose Company, who were promptly on the job in response to the alarm and in a few moments put out the hungry flames which had quickly enveloped the entire build-ing and converted the interior into a seething furnace. Walking nonchalantly up to the crowd that had assembled, an old clay pipe drooping picturesquely from a corner of hi mouth, he remarked:

"Puttin' her out airight, aint they !" Railroad Trespassing Dangerous.

The danger of trespassing on railroad propstatement of the Pennsylvania Railroad, that 8.523 people have been killed and 8.285 injured: on their system alone since 1900. TUNNEL BILL A LAW

Both Houses Pass Measure Extending Franchises Over Veto of Governor Making Delaware 2000 ft. Southwest corner of Atlantic and Pitts-Tube Possible.

The Seniste Thursday last went over the iovernor's veto on the Gaunt measure popularly known as the "Junnel bill" and again passed It, similar action having been taken by the Assembly and the blil is now a law. Under its provisions a franchise can be granted to a company building a tube under the Dela-ware for fifty years, the former limit being only twenty years.

Now that a fifty-year franchise is possible, sarly action is anticipated on the tunnel project, which is to give South Jersey direct trainservice to Philadelphia. It is thought that a company will be organized for this purpose and several capitalists are said, to have offered assistance.

Plans for the tunnel call for a tube with see tions for express trains, trolley cars, wagon and foot passengers. Not only would such a tunnel give commuters in South Jersey quicke connection with Pulladelphia, but it would Amplify the shipping of truck from South Jersey farms to the city markets. All the principal South Jersey municipalities are inerested in the project and it is to be hoped that a company will be formed immediately for the construction of the tunnel.
