Or Else You May Have To Face Charge Of Murder. The doctrine of self-defense, as applied to

murder cases in this State, was modified in an important degree Monday by an opinion filed by Chief Justice Gummere who says that the doctrine of self-defense will not justify one person in killing another if, by retreating, he can reasonably escape death himself or escape serious bodily harm.

Counsel for the appellant contended that the

The Chief Justice mays that this is the rule in many states, but not in New Jersey, and holds that the rule enunciated in this State for 125 years is that no man is justified in taking the life of another unless the act is, or appears,

true meaning of law is that when a man is in

reasonably necessary as the only inavoiding his own destruction. This jule does not enunciate any obligat to retreat, the court holds, but it necessarily implies that life may be taken when to do so affords the only means by which the slayer might avoid his own destruction or some great bodily harm.
