RUSH AT COTTON MILL
EXTRA HANDS PUT ON
Record Output Will Result From Many Improvements Made.

Every department of the cotton mill here is crammed with work and extra hands are being taken on to meet the demand for cotton goods for which there seems to be a greater need than usual owing to war conditions, large quantities being shipped abroad.

Sup. Charles H. Kearns has every section of the mill in splendid condition to admit new records for output. The latest machinery on the market for the cotton goods industry has been secured and the mill is one of the most up-to-date in the country.

Two residences on Main Street belonging to the company, one old Norwegian homestead which was recently purchased, are being rebuilt and will be open at an early date for tenants. The company has generally improved its houses and three quarters, provided primarily for the accommodation of employees, are said to be better kept than those of any other industry in the state.

All sections of the mill grounds seem to have undergone a Spring clean-up recently, for they present a very neat and attractive appearance from the country road, giving visitors a good impression of the enterprise as they enter along the lake.

The new pneumatic cotton conveyor from the warehouse to the mill, said to be the largest in the world, is working to perfection.

The bales of Egg Cotton are now unloaded from the cars directly into the warehouse, where they are sorted, and the cotton fed to a large machine which tears it apart and clean it and sends it on its way to the mill, through a large pipe that runs under the county road and along the side of the lake. One can easily drive about enough to keep all the men busy.

Large crowds will vote this afternoon between the hours of one o'clock in the afternoon and nine o'clock in the evening. Primary election will be held in every voting district of the state for the purpose of selecting delegates and alternate to the Republican and Democratic National Conventions. Fred. Schuchardt Claimed By Death.

Peter Schuchardt, for many years clerk of the Board of Chosen Freeholders and formerly a member of that body from Egg Harbor City, passed away Thursday morning last at a private hospital in Philadelphia, where he was taken a few months ago in a final effort to overcome an illness of several years' standing.

Mr. Schuchardt was fifty-two years of age. He was well-known throughout the county and the news of his death was a severe shock to his many friends. The body will be brought to the late home in Egg Harbor City where services will be held.

He was one of the most prominent citizens of Egg Harbor and was foremost in organizing the gas and electric companies and took an active part in public affairs. As Clerk to the county board he made a careful efficient official, whose excellent work has occasioned frequent praise.

Jail For Driving Without Light.

"An amendment to the road law, passed by the last session of the Legislature, adds to the penalty for violating the act requiring that every vehicle driven by horse, horse or other animal shall carry a light during the period from October 1st until March 1st, half an hour before sunrise, and whenever the roads may be found to be more than one-half mile long distance. Before it has been a fine of \$50 to \$100. Now, on failure to pay a fine the violator may be sent to jail for not more than thirty days."

Fish and Game Seasons.

Quail, ruffed, squirrel, male English ring-necked pheasant, ruffed grouse, prairie chicken and Hungarian partridge—November 10 to December 15.

Wild turkey—closed season until March 15, 1919.

Female English ring-necked pheasant—closed season until April 15, 1919.

Reed bird—September and October.

All smallshore birds not designated by name under the open season, little brown, sandhill and whooping cranes, swans, curlews, upland plover and wood ducks—closed season until September 1, 1918.

Shore birds—only black breasted plover, jack snipe and greater and lesser yellowlegs—September 1 to December 15.

Tails, oocla, gallinules, marsh hen or mud hen—September, October and November.

Woodcock—October 10 to November 30.

Waterfowl, except wood duck and swan—November, December and January.

Brown, brook and rainbow trout and landlocked salmon—April 1 to July 15.

Black bass, Oswego bass, white bass, crappie and pipe perch—June 15 to November 30.

Pike and pickerel—May 20 to November 30; January 1 to 20.

Skunk, mink, muskrat, otter (may only be trapped)—January 1 to April 1; November 15 to December 31.

Deer, buck and does over one year old—last three Wednesdays in October and first Wednesday in November.

Raccoon—October 1 to December 15.
