under the former law, have been issued in CLASS SOCIAL FOR BOY. Atlantic County, for which the applicants paid \$10 each. They were issued before this law was passed and are good for one year. The County Clerk is in a dilemma regarding the Rounding Out His Ninth Year of Pereffect of these ficenses and has written to the Commission for instructions, believing that ones who have paid for there licenses either have the right to hunt under them dur ing 1915 or their money should be refunded. be unlawful for eny unnaturalized, toreign-born person to hunt for or capture, or kill in this State, any wild bird or animal. either game or otherwise, of any description, excepting in defense of person or property; and to that end it shall be unlawful for any unnaturalized, foreign-born person, within this Minte. to either own or be posses end of a chests gun or ritle of any make. Each and every rson violating any provision of this section shall be liable to a penalty of twenty dollars for each offinse; provided, that in addition to the before-named penalty, all guns of the before-mentioned kinds found in possession or under control of an unnaturalized, foreignborn person, shall, upon conviction of such person for such offense, be declared forfeited to the State of New Jersey, and shall be sold by the Board of Fish and Game Commissioners as hereinafter directed; provided, however, that this act shall not apply to any unnaturalized, foreign born person who is the owner of res estate in this State to the value of two thou Bookstdingson ils evoda vrailob bine

2-The possession of a shotgun or rifle at any place outside of buildings, within this State, by an unnaturalized, foreign-born person, shall be conclusive proof of a violation of the provision of section one of this act, and shall render any person convicted thereof liable to the penalty as fixed by said section.

8—The presence of a shotgun or rifle in a room or house, or building or tent, or camp of controlled by an unnaturalized, foreign-born person, shall be prime facie evidence that such gun is owned or controlled by the person occupying or controlling the property in which such gun is found, and shall render such person liable to the penalty imposed by section one of this act.

4-Notice of the seizure of all guns, made for violation of any provision of section one of this act, shall be sent to the Board of Fish and, Game Commissioners, at Trenton, by the officer making such selzure, immediately after the rendering of judgment in any prosecution brought for violation of said provisions, and the gun so seized shall be sold, at the discretion of the Board of Fish and Game Cammissioners and the proceeds of such sale shall be paid to the Board of Fish and Game Commissioner

for the use of said board. 5-The Board of Fish and Game Commis sioners, the fish and game protector and the fish and game wardens, shall have the right and power, when they suspect the concealment by an unnaturalized, foreign-born person of guns of the beforementioned kind, to apply to a justice of the peace within this State, who, upon receipt of proof made by affidavit of the probable cause for believing in such concealment, shall issue a seach warrant, and cause s search to be made in any place; and to that end, in the execution of such warrant, the officer shall have power, after demand and refusel, to cause any building, room, inclosure or car to be broken open and entered, and any closet, chest, locker, box, trunk, crate, basket or package, or any receptacle, to be open and

6-This act shall be enforced in accordance with the provisions of an act entitled "An act o provide a uniform procedure for the enforcement of all laws relating to fish, game and sirds, and for the recovery of penalties for violations thereof," approved March twenty ninth, eighteen hundred and ninety-seven and the amendments and supplements thereto. 7-All acts or parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed, and this act shall take effect effect immediately. ### HOME-MIXED FERTILIZER COSTS LESS, GROWS MORE

Three Demonstrations Held On County Farms By Mr. Douglass.

The home fertilizer mixing demonstration conducted on Mr. John Huenke's farm at Cologne March 11 brought out many points regarding the efficient use of fertilizers. Mr. Elwood Douglass, the County Demonstrator pointed out economic importance of a broader knowledge upon the part of the farmers in the purchasing and use of commercial fertilizer. The waste from nitrogen in the use of commercial fertilizers in the United States is very

great. The farmers are now paying more than in the county. It has been shown by the New Jersey Agri-

cultural Experiment station that home mixed fertilizers, or in other words, the purchasing of materials to be mixed upon the farm brings about a greater interest upon the part of the farmer with resultant increased crops and inreased use of fertilizers.

In order to encourage the farmers in the use of high grade fertilizers mixed on the farm. Mr. Douglass conducted three home-mixing lemonstrations, one at the farm of William Krumm, Bargaintown; one upon Mr. John Huenke's farm at Cologue, and one apon Mi John Cassagga's farm at Buens. At the first two mentioned demonstrations a ton or more of a 4-8-8 mixture was prepared. At Mr. John Chasanza's a 4-10-3 was prepared. The fertilizer in each case was divided into 75 pound lots among the farmers. Mr. John H. Voorbees, of the Experiment Station, assisted Mr. Douglass and addressed the gatherings of farmers, showing by actual figures, based upon the cost of the fertilizer purchased and the price farmers were paying for the same fertiliser, now a saving of from \$6 to \$10 a ton might be made

This work demonstrates the efficient use of plant food and at the same time teaches many points regarding the growth of the different crops to which the farmers apply the fertilizer because each farmer receiving the fertilizer keeps a record of its effect. It is to be hoped that the farmers will benefit by this excellent work and call on Mr. Douglass for assistance when-
