

TRAMPING TO SHORE FIVE YOUTHS JAILED FOR BUILDING FIRE

CAUGHT IN RAIN THEY WERE DRYING THEIR CLOTHING

STATE WARDENS RELENTLESS

Declare They Will Arrest Every Person Caught Starting Fires Without Permits In Order To Break Up Alarming Increase In Number of Brush Blazes—Boys Could Not Pay Fine.

Out of work in Philadelphia and tramping to the seashore to seek employment, five youths, Charles McGowan, Max Doherty, John McGowan, Thomas McManney and Clement Farley, all of them in the neighborhood of twenty, ran afoul of the new State fire law Wednesday evening last near Rialland when they were arrested by the State Fire Warden Charles P. Wilber and Warden Jesse Abbott for setting a fire in the brush with a first getting the permit from the warden.

The circumstances of the arrest appeared somewhat harsh but the warden declared they had no alternative, and that the law was obliged to impose the minimum fine as the law allows him no discretion.

The warden went on the lookout for the one who started the fire and proceeded down the road they came across the new fire, around which the young men were sleeping.

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WARDENS AFTER PERSONS RESPONSIBLE FOR FIRES

Big Forest Conflagrations Destroying Large Areas of Woodland.

Several forest fires throughout the County have been devastating large areas of young woodland and swamps during the past week and yesterday two were still in progress, one at Weymouth, under control and the other, working from McKean City towards Hilly's Mill, sweeping everything before it despite the efforts of sixty men who have been fighting night and day to stay the flames.

The latter fire is by far the worst of the work and its origin is being investigated by Fire Warden Joseph E. Abbott. It started somewhere back of McKean City and spread rapidly. Yesterday it covered hundreds of acres and was still spreading, but the warden were hopeful of stopping it by Thursday.

The warden will have no stone unturned to fix the blame for every blaze that starts and arrests momentarily expected.

NEW JERSEY TROOPS READY TO RUSH DOWN TO MEXICO

Adjutant General Sadler Awaiting Orders From War Secretary.

New Jersey can present a war strength of 5,000 men in the National Guard to fight against the Mexicans if all the companies are mobilized into service. The guard can be turned out to-day with 4,750 officers and enlisted men. The new members, who would be necessary to bring the guard up to the required strength, would be scattered among the various companies, and soon would become proficient. Enlistment would take but a short time.

Adjutant General Wilbur F. Sadler is awaiting orders from Secretary of War Garrison. He expects to hear from him at any moment. It is likely that the mobilization of the troops would take place at San Juan. There are fifty companies of infantry, three companies of cavalry, two batteries of field artillery, one signal corps and one field hospital corps. With the present strength of a company of infantry is sixty-five enlisted men and officers, the war strength is 108.

All of the enlisted men will be vaccinated if the orders are received for the movement of the "New Jersey militia." That will prevent the spread of disease. The guardsmen will also be "hardened up" as much as possible at the state reviewing grounds. That will have to be done in the "regular" service if the orders received are of an emergency character. The companies are at present fully equipped to the peace strength, and the federal government is prepared to furnish arms and ammunition to bring the troops to the war strength.

The present number in the guard is 4,831.

SPELLERS TO COMPETE FROM COUNTY SCHOOLS

Court House Will Be Scene Saturday Afternoon Next of Close Rivalry For Cash Prizes Between Pupils of Several Districts.

Spellers from Pleasantville, Egg Harbor, Buena Vista, Hamilton, Absecon and other districts of Atlantic County will meet here in the Court House at 2:30 p. m. Saturday next to engage in a competitive test in spelling.

The words for the test will be selected and dictated by Prof. Henry Miller, principal of the Atlantic City High School, and will consist of a list of one hundred words, followed if necessary by additional lists also selected and dictated by Prof. Miller.

Prizes to be awarded will be as follows: First prize \$5; second prize \$3; third prize \$2; besides five additional one-dollar prizes to the five next highest pupils, making prizes in all, the committee making arrangements for the contest feels very much encouraged by the reports of the interest pupils are taking in the contest. A large attendance and a good contest is anticipated.

Judges will be appointed to examine papers and announce the result as soon as the contest is over. A musical program will be furnished by a number of the schools taking part in the contest. Papers will be furnished but pupils requested to furnish their own pencils. The contest will consist of written words.

THREE SPRING ROMEOS

After deliberating for six hours a jury in the Atlantic Court of Common Pleas returned a verdict in the suit of Walter G. Penhollow, collect \$500 damages from George Zipper, awarding the plaintiff the sum of six cents.

Heaven Brown and Charles Martin, both colored, were convicted when placed on trial before Judge Cole Wednesday on an indictment charging them with a statutory offense. Martin received the maximum penalty of six months in the County Jail and a fine of \$50, while the Brown woman was sent to the Girls Reformatory. In addition following the trial on the statutory charge, Helen Brown was convicted of the charge of jewelry and silverware valued at about \$300 from the apartment of Dr. W. B. Taylor where she was employed as a maid.

Charged with carrying a butcher knife, Mrs. Augusta Pizarro was convicted by a jury Thursday on an indictment for carrying concealed deadly weapons. The court reserved sentence. Today an indictment against the plaintiff and defendant charging her with a statutory offense and assault and battery and Joseph Gaithera charged with advising the taking of human life, when they were placed on trial in the Criminal Court at May's Landing.

Pleading not guilty to an indictment charging him with malicious mischief, George Fowler, of Haddonfield, was sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 in weekly installments of \$3 by Judge Cole. Fowler was also placed on probation and informed that he must abstain from liquor or he would be brought before the court and a full sentence imposed.

Jennie Cain, accused of selling liquor without a license, was arraigned before Judge Cole yesterday and pleaded guilty to the charge. The court imposed a fine of \$50, to be paid in weekly installments of \$2 and she is to undergo charge of the probation officer for three weeks. Harry Norman was arraigned yesterday for a violation of the contract law and was convicted, but was convicted on a further charge of receiving the goods knowing them to have been stolen. The jury returned their verdict after Judge Cole had departed for Atlantic City so sentence was not passed. Norman made the novel defense that someone had left the coat in his yard, though he had no idea who the philanthropic person might be.

BEN ALLEN GETS SIX MONTHS ON CONFESSION OF GUILT

Pleading Guilty To Charge of Keeping Gambling House.

Retracting a former plea of not guilty and entering one of guilty to two indictments charging him with conducting a gambling establishment, "Ben" Allen was sentenced to serve a term of six months in the County Jail. Allen at once surrendered himself to Sheriff Ingersoll and started to serve his sentence.

Allen came quite a distance when he was called before the Court and announced that he intended to plead guilty to the charges against him. The date of his trial had been set for Friday and it was commonly supposed that he would contest the case. It is thought that the defendant was deterred by the decision of the Court of Errors and Appeals, who recently sustained the conviction of Jarvis Griffin, with whom Allen was jointly indicted.

Edward N.O. Donnell, steward of the Elwood Country Club, was fined \$50 and placed on probation for one year when he was arraigned before Judge Cole Tuesday charged with selling liquor without a license at the club. Other developments in this matter are looked for after the next session of the Grand Jury.

William Y. Holliba was convicted by Judge Cole on an indictment charging him with carrying a knife. He was sentenced to pay a fine of one dollar a week for two years and he placed on probation for this length of time. Holliba has been confined in the County Jail since the first of the year.

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MOVE SAW MILL TO SOUTH RIVER TRACT

Six Years' Cutting Provided In Cedar Swamp Along This Stream and Branches Lately Secured by Daniel Birch.
