CAUGHT IN RAIN THEY WERE DRYING THEIR CLOTHING

WARDENS RELENTLESS STATE

Declare They Will Arrest Every Person Caught Starting Fires Break Up Alarming Increase In Could Not Pay Kine.

Out of work in Phliadelphia and tramping youths, Charles McCoombs, Max Dobrof, John McGovern, Thomas McTainney and Clement Farley, all of them in the neighborhood of twenty, ran afoul of the new State fire law Wednesday evening last near Richland when hey were accested by the Blate Fire Warder Charles P. Wilber and Warden Jesse Abbott for setting a fire in the brush without flist getting the proper permit from the warden. They were given a hearing Thursday after spending the night in the County Jall and ocked up in deault of \$50, fine after pleading guilty to the charge. They were bright, hones appearing boys and all declared they had never been under arrest before.

The circumstances of the arrest appeared comewhat harsh but the wardens, declared they had no alternative, and Magistrate J. A. Lambert before whom the hearing was held, was obliged to impose the minimum fine as the law allows him no discretion. The only hope the young men have of getting out is through reduction of the fine by the State Forestry Commission, the only power that can reduce the numbhment under the law State Warden Wilber promised them he would lay the matter before the Commission during the coming week.

The young men had walked all day and after the shower Wednesday evening built a small fire along the roadside to rest and dry their clothing. They were not aware that they had to get a permit to do this. New Jersey can present a war strength of 5,940 men in the National Guard to fight gainst the Mexicans if all the companies are nustered into service. The guard can be urned out to-day with 4,470 officers and enlisted men. The new members, who would be necessary to bring the guard up to the required var strength, would be scattered among the various companies, and soon would become proficient.
