Two election cases growing out of indletments returned by the ellsor-drawn grand Just are set down for trial Tuesday next in the 3. Court of Oyer and Terminer before Justice Samuel Kalisch, the prosecution to be conducted by Attorney General Wilson. The defendants are James E. Scull and Charles E. C. Steelman, of Somers' Point City, the former indicted for alleged bribery at the 1910 general election and the latter indicted with him Jointly for conspiracy to pervert elections. The hour fixed for trial is ten o'clock,

His machine was travelling at a rapid rate and he did not see the wire until right in front of him. Bracing himself for the contact he kept his seat until he could stop the machine, not however, before he had torn the wire from the pole. His face was badly lacerated and his neck and shoulders strained from the effort to keep the wire from pulling his head back-
