In view o they will not be unduly alarmed when it is this fact all organizations dealing with the source of our national food supply have been pressed thto service and asked to assist in relieving as far as possible this signation by increasing the production of all farm crops. This material should be confined to small garden plots and to farms that are especially suspied to the growing of vegetables nd truck crops. Large areas that are to be farmed by communities should be restricted to the production of staple crops. Such crops should include potatoes, turnips, corn, beans, etc., as they can all be stored in their normal

sert to anyone under eighteen years of age, The high price of tin and glassware and the of the above material may make it impossible for the preserving and camping of large quantities of perishable material. The growing of corn and beans is particularly erary this year, and new ground should be devoted to these crops.

All eggs are not fertile, and not all fertile eggs produce living chicks, as many of the embryos die during incubation. If such eggs are not removed at intervals, they are apt to injure the hatch. Eggs should be tested twice during the incubation period. On the seventh day the eggs should be candled and all infertile eggs removed. These eggs will appear absolutely clear before the candle. Any eggs at this time which show blood rings, which mean a dead embryo, also should be removed. On the fourteenth day the eggs should again be candled, and all containing dead embryon eliminated. The vigorous embryo at this time appears as a dark, opaque mass, occupying most of the interior of the egg, other than the air cell. The area occupied should be clear and distinct, with a very definite line bound-

Removing non-hatchable eggs allows more room for the other eggs, and makes possible doubling up and thus increasing the capacity of a number of incubators. Also, such tests indicate how the fertility is running from the various matings, and by candling the size of the air cell can be determined. This acts as a for them. On the seventh day the air cell should be about one-fourth of an inch deep, on the fourteenth day about one-half to five-eighths of an inch deep, and on the nineteenth day about threefourths of an inch deep.

Corn is the ideal emergency crop for New Jersey. One bushel of corn is equivalent in food value to 4 bushels of potatoes. It is our biggest yielding grain per acre. It is easy to raise and always reasonably sure of success. range of 3 to 5 weeks is permissible in planting. Most soils will grow corn. Moderate tillage will suffice, though fit will not always result in maximum yields. The harvesting period can be much prolonged with little or no loss of grain. This allows a very efficient use of labor. Corn is easy to market, it is not perishable and is readily stored. Much can be fed on the farm and converted into milk, eggs and mest. Its value as a human food has long been recognized. We pever have exported much cor but Europe now demands a supply as food for her people: The selling price undoubtedly will be high this year. What staple crop would be more profitable? A more safe, cor servative, and desirable crop could not be alleviate the present food shortage. Each additional acre planted means more food, and hence an added service to the country, sa well as greater profits.








An Expert's Testimony


