WENT BEYOND DEPTH IN
SWIFT STREAM.

Playmate Prompt To Summon
Help But When Body Was Re-
covered Life Had Fled — Was
Bathing During Noon Recess.

Tempted by the warm weather during the noon recess yesterday to take a plunge in the cold waters of Babcock's Creek, a swift running stream skirting the woods in the rear of the school grounds, eleven-year-old Robert Wagner, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Wagner, of West Egg Harbor, ventured beyond his depth and was drowned before the eyes of a playmate, who was prompt to summon help.

Floating into the lower waters of the channel within a few minutes it was discovered, Charles Stewart first caught sight of the body and in a few seconds the pitiful little form was brought ashore. Dr. H. C. James, who was in the boat from which the body was discovered, pronounced life extinct and the remains were hurried to a nearby residence.

Harry Birch volunteered an automobile and with the little sister of the boy, both of whom were in the boat, went to the Landing station where the body was recovered. The father made a hasty run to West End High school, where Winkler. The unfortunate boy's mother was reached by telephone in Philadelphia and caught an early train here. Both parents are now nearly prostrated from shock.
