Placing prisoners of the County Jall at work in a County workhouse, or on roads and bridges, under special guards to be appointed by the Sheriff, is the recommendation of the Grand Jury, which, after a long consideration of the subject handed in the following special seniment Tuesday last:

Railroad Says New Statute I: Unconstitutional and Will Mean Confiscation of Property Without Just Compensation.

Constitutionality of the grade-crossing clim nation law passed by the last session of the legislature as one of the campaign pledges of he Democratic party has been attacked by the Central Railroad of New Jersey in a answer filed with the publicubility commi ion to's petition seeking the elimination of

the company's grade crossings in Perth An It is contended that the act is nothing mo nor, less than the medium of confiscation of property without just compensation. The petition of Perth Amboy grew from a resolu tion passed by the common council, request ing the Central and Lehigh Valley roads to do away certain crossings at grade. The contention of the city is that these crossings are sand dollars of this will be raised by bonds. dangerous to public safety and that traffe is mueded by them

The answer sets up that by this act the co of chancery is deprives of its exclusive furisdiction in the regulation of easements and that the act in the title is multifarlous. It is further contended that the law is in violation of the ourteenth amendment to the constitution of the United States.
