TAFT ANSWERS COL. ROOSEVELT

President Exposes Duplicity of His Old Friend.

REPLIES TO EVERY CHARGE.

Produces Proof That Roosevelt Deliberately Misrepresented Him In This? Campaign-Declares Him Menace to Republic and to Prosperity.

President Taft in three speeches in Massachusetts on April 25 personally answered the misrepresentations of Theodore Roosevelt of the position of the president with respect to the issues of this campaign, with respect to his administration and of himself personally. The president said he regretted the necessity of speaking plain-Ir about his "old friend," to whom he frankly admitted a personal obliga-The president said, however, that the situation created by Mr. Roosevelt's personal attacks on himand his administration made forther silence intolerable.

The basis of the president's reply to Mr. Roosevelt was the well known "square deal" maxim of Mr. Roosevelt. As he answered each Roosevelt charge the president inquired, "Have I had a square deal?" In order these subjects were treated by the president. Misrepresentation of the President's Speeches.

First.-Under this heading President Taft declared that Mr. Roosevelt had deliberately misrepresented him when he said, "Mr. Taft defines the issue when he says that our government is and should be a government of all the people by a representative part of the people."

"The excerpt which Mr. Roosevelt uses is taken from my speech at Toledo," said the president. "It is garbled. I did not say this 'should be a government of all the people by a representative part of the people. I said it is a government of all the people by a representative part of the people," and it is. I pointed out that this gov ernment of ours is a government by the adult voting males in order to show the necessity for constitutional restrictions to protect the nonvoters among the people against the possible. injustice and aggression of a majority of the voters. Was it honest, was it fair in Theodore Roosevelt to selze one sentence from a speech to garble it and then give it a meaning which he knew from the context it could not bear? Do the people of Massachu setts think that this is a square deal?"

Unfair Charge as to Bosses, Second.-In reply to the charge that

"bosses" were supporting his candidney President Taft pointed out that William Film of Pittsburgh, "one of the worst municipal bosses that the history of that state knows;" Walter Brown of Ohio, "the only boss in full commission in the state," and William Ward of New York were supporting Mr. Roosevelt. Senator Crane of Mas sachusetts, whom Mr. Roosevelt has mentioned. President Taft said, had "three times been invited by Mr. Roosevelt into his cabinet" and that Mr. Roosevelt had invited him to manage his presidential campaign in 1904.

"When I consider the eagerness with which Mr Roosevelt has accepted in his various campaigns the assistance of Mr. Aldrich, Mr. Cannon, Mr. Penrose, Mr. Quay, Mr. Platt, Mr. For-Aker and many other men." said the president. "I do not hesitate to savy that it involves the most anda lons of frontery on his part to attack me because men be characterizes as losses. are now supporting me. This is peculfarly unfair on his part in view of his well known political history and is an Other Instance of his departing from the rule of a square deal."

False Statements In Lorimor Case to People of Illinois.

confer with his colleagues on the Outlook as to its wisdom and public benefit and let me know his and their judgment. He replied approving the agreement in the most enthusiastic terms and complimenting me for baying brought it forward."

The president then made public a letter of his own to Mr. Roosevelt, dated Jan. 11, 1911, and a reply from Mr. Roosevelt the following day. In his letter the president declared he signed the Payne tariff bill not only because It was a better law than the Dingley law, but because it was a concession by the Republican party that down ward revision was necessary and because the old doctrine that what was needed was a Chinese wall had been departed from.

Admitting that while it might tempornrily have a tendency to reduce the cost of food products, the president said he believed it would in the end tend to a stability of food prices. The president said also, "We shall get a revision, not as heavy a one as I would like, but a substantial one and equivalent certainly to the French reciprocity treaty (between Canada and France) and probably more-on manu, business and "amounted to nothing in Shah at Bijapur. factures." He also pointed out that the end but the establishment of a Canada's entire business after the adoption of the treaty would then beconducted through the United States. To this letter Mr. Roosevelt replied:

It seems to me that what you propose to do with Canada is admirable from evry standpoint. I firmly believe in free rade with Canada for both economic and political reasons. As you say, labor cost is substantially the same in the two countries, so that you are amply justified by the platform (Republican, 1988) Whethor Canada will accept such reciprocity I do not know but it is greatly to your credit to make the effort. It may damage the Republican party for awhile, but it will surely benefit the party in the end, especially if you tackle wool, cotton, etc. as you propose Ever yours,

"I submit that Mr. Roosevelt's course on reciprocity is not in accord with the square deal," said the president.

Charges of Fraud.

Fifth . Concerning the charge that he had "received stolen goods," the president characterized the charge of Mr. Roosevelt and Senator Dixon as "insult ing" and "hysterical."
