### PACKING AN IMPORTANT FEATURE

VOCATIONAL SCHOOL PLAN WILL ELIMINATE MUCH LOSS

Considerable attention has been given in Atlantic County during the past few years to the question of increased production of farm ois, with the result that there has been n many marked instances an over p of farm produce, supecially for local markets The cause of this increased production can be aid at the doors of our Experiment Station National Department of Agriculture at Was ington, and Schools of Agriculture through the aid of Farm Demonstrators, agricultural periodicals and buildins, all of which have played an equal share and part in the dissemination

of agricultural knowledge.

Iti many instances there has been an over production of material with present methods of distribution. The peach grower readily realizes this situation during a "peach year." Bushels upon bushels of peaches rotted on the frees and ground last year because of the fact that the producer was not able to pick and market them at a profit. With the acquiring of more vgricultural knowledge, yields per sero are going to increase until what is now called a large crop will be but normal.

In the growing of farm produce farmers have scome fairly well schooled, and where there is a fallure it is usually due to some one or two rs which limited the production. Withfruit, it is frequently a lack of spray; with vegetables, improper culture or tillage methods, and with general farm produce often poor seed. These factors are being readily eliminated through the activities of the agricultural chools and Extension Department

The Atlantic County Vocational Schools feel that the time has now arrived for the inauguration of better methods of marketing and disposition of farm produce. Farm produce in Atlantic County is shipped either to markets in Philadelphia and New York or to the conabore resorts. Each market lakes its particular kind and quality of produce. If the farmers are ever going to realise more for the produce that they have grown, there are two or three things that will have to be kept constantly in mind. First, a better quality of material: ondly, a better and more thorough grading and packing of this material; and thirdly, a system of distribution. These factors, Prof. Robert D. Maltby believes, every farmer will agree are the three most important things that have to be considered at the present time in the handling of farm products.

grown anywhere in the United States. This is particularly true of sweet potatoes, peache and many of the truck crops. But this mate rial is harvested in such a manner that it loses its quality. Again, everything that grows upon an acre of ground is not necessarily of the same grade and quality. In fact, there may be no first grade material produced though many farmers that do grade their fruit and vegetables sort it into three distinct grades and call the best grade " Primer" or "Fancy, Thirdly, the time is coming when the farme has got to have a closer relationship with the consumer in order that he may become bette acquainted with what the consumer wants furnished him, supply fresher produce, and realize a larger return for the same.

The Atlantic County Vocational School stai is at the present time working upon a system that they hope will be a forerunner of bette methods of marketing for the farmers in the section. At a recent meeting of the Vocational B and of Education a resolution was adopted authorizing the printing of a label that could be used by the farmers of Atlantic County to market their produce. The label is to bear this inscription, "Packed and Graded under the on of the Atlantic County Vocational Schools." The oldect of this label is twofold. First, to standardise the pack of all farm pro the best showing in the singing equiest, th duce and secondly, to enable the shipper or the producer to realize more on his produce by having a guarantee of the quality of that package on the face of it.

In order to systematize and standardize the ers are planning to hold meetings in which methods of grading and packing will be taught and only those who have taken lessons in one of these schools or who will grade and pack as directed by some member of the Voca sool staff will be given the use of the label. The label will be given free to all those who agree to pack and grade as directed. The schools are working to establish a standard pack and graded material. Three grades fo it will be established, Fancy, Choice and Plain, though the term Extra Fancy on be used where the quality of the produce is

For the first year the schools expect to confine their attention to the present members of the Vocational Schools, though any farmer in Atlantic County can receive the benefit of this label providing he will attend one of the es on packing and grading.

It will be impossible for the agricultural ers to inspect every package of produce that will bear this label and they will have to depend upon the honesty of the farmers for its proper use in putting up the package. Any ast complaint received by the Vocations forfeiture of the right to use such labels by the

rmers responsible for the complaint, At the present time the Vocational Schools are tindying conditions in the Atlantic City markets in order to be able to meet the demands of this trade. It is hoped that the farmers will this year make an attempt t grow a better quality of material and to thoroughly grade and pack same before ship-This advice is given regardless
