Every driver or operator of a vehicle approaching the intersection of a street or public read shall grant the right of way at such intersection to any vehicle approaching from its right; provided, that wherever traffic officers are stationed they shall have full power to

regulate traffic. Slow-moving and heavy-laden vehicles shall keep as near the right-hand boundary of the road or the right-hand curb, as the case may or, as possible, so as to allow free passage for

nter-moving vehicles It shall be unlawful for bleycle riders and persons on roller skates to hold fast or to hitch onto trolley cars or other vehicles.

No vehicle shall back or make a turn in any treet if by doing so it interferes with other was called, only three contestants, pupils of vehicles, but shall go around a block or to a street sufficiently wide to turn in without

No person or persons shall drive any horsedrawn vehicle or ride any bleycle upon or along any street at a greater speed than at the rate of twelve miles an hour, excepting, however, when turning a corner of any street the ate shall be not greater than 6 miles an hour. Every vehicle must stop with its right side to the curb. Vehicles shall not stop within 10 feet of a fire

hydrant or a street crossing. Horses must not be left standing unfaste and must not be fastened to telephone poles. Bicycles must not be ridden without holding nandlebars, nor must children under ten years of age be carried on sume.


