HELD TWO BUSY SESSIONS DURING WEEK.

Court Promptly Quashed Partisan Effort To Make Democratic Capital By Unjust Challenge Of Jurois.

Two busy sessions were held Tuesday and and Thursday by the May Grand Jury, following the call of that body Tuesday last by Sheriff E. C. Johnson, the administration of the oath by County Clerk Samuel Kirby and the charge of Justice T. W. Trenchard, who instructed the jurors to find bills of indletment against all who are shown by evidence to have violated any of the statutes of New Jersey. Justice Trenchard dwelt at length in his charge on the allegations of irregular election methods at Atlantic City, referring also to alleged violations of the excise and gambling laws, asking the jurory to indict if the evidence offered a reasonable presumption of guilt. At the request of the Court, B. Nelson Gaskill, Assistant Afterney General of New Jersey, was present to assist Prosecutor-Goldenberg in prescriting Ovidence to the jury.

An unsuccessful attempt was made by S. Cameron Hinkle to have four members of the Jury discharged because they held office under the Republican administration of municipal Afficies. Minkle's motion caused a stir in the prowded court-room just after the prembers of the Jury and been called by County Clerk Bamuel Kirby, "As a friend of the Court," said Blinkle, "and Independent of the prose oution, I ask the privilege of inquiring as to the fitness of certain members of this grand Jury to serve as such, because they hold office under Republican administration."

Justice Trenchard granted Hinkle an opportunity to show why the members were untit for duty, and Hinkle, after scrutinizing the Jurymen, named Hugh P. Genor, City Assessor: John Leeds, Bupervisor of High. Charles M. Speldel, Water Commissioner, as plouship pennant last season and has for many those he deemed Impossible of being fairminded. Each of the jurors were placed on their oath and sworn, frankly stating their allegiance to the Republican party, except Mr. Speidel, who said he was a staunch Democrat. 
